Three regiments forming the German Sixth Reserve Division were annihilated as fighting units, losing 69 officers and about 2,800 men as prisoners. This was a Brandenburg division.






AVIATORS ACTIVE Paris, Aug. 25-The brilliant work of French acronauts was a factor of decisive importance in the battle of Verdun, according to Geroges Prade, an aviation authority who witnessed the French attack this week as a representative of The Journal. He says that General Guillaumat cut all red tape and did away with discouraging delays of some local importance. We also captured an enemy post during the night in the neigh-borhood of Lombaertzyde and secured a few prisoners and a machine gun. 
