SIMCOE BOARD OF EDUCATION MET

Increases in Salaries Granted to Teachers of the Public Schools

Simcoe Take One (From our own Correspondent) Simcoe, June 22.—The Board of Education met last night to receive the report of the management committee.

The last recommendation handed up was for a general increase of salaries for the public school staff. While the matter was under discussion, Chairman Monroe remarked that the youth of 40-day required more instruction in writing and letters in some other subjects, commonly known about the board as frills.

Two additional teachers are required, and the committee was authorized to fill the blanks. Heartened by their progress and cognizant of the necessity, the committee recommended an increase of \$50 for Mr. Christie, and \$100 each for Mr. Martin and Miss Brown, and these went through.

From a sheaf of applicants for the position as teacher of Latin, history and art, Miss Hilda Smith, of Toronto, formerly of Caledonia, was chosen.

A head for the mathematical department was not selected. The new salaries are: High School, Principal Christie, \$1,700; Mr. Martin, (science) \$1,450; Miss Brown, (general) \$925.

Public Schools: Principal McPherson, \$1,250; Mr. House \$900; Miss Steinhoff \$650; Miss Collier \$650; Miss McCool \$650; Miss M. Thompson \$625; Miss V. Knight \$625; Miss Bauhaugh, \$625; Miss P. Thompson \$625; Miss Haddow \$625; Mrs. Francis \$625; Miss Allen \$600; Miss Porter \$650.

Prof. Marshall, \$290. The increases, except for vacancies to be filled, amount in total to \$975.

The caretakers asked nothing and got nothing. Mr. Haddow gets \$518.96 at the Central School, Mrs. Gibson \$110 at the Market school, and Mr. Cribb \$430 at the High school.

The increases, when both high and public school staffs are complete will total about half a million dollars. The extra members of the public school staff will offset the dropping of one teacher from the high school.

MARKETS

Maximum prices have been named by prime growers and growers of raisins on this year's crop, and it is intimated these have been approved by the Food Administration. Raisins from Washington, Primos named are higher than last year and even higher than the trade generally expected.

Canada's allotment of coffee to be handled through United States ports has been determined on by food boards at Washington and Ottawa, Canada being allowed for the year 70 per cent. of last year's total, which will be distributed on a pro rata basis.

Montreal—It may be stated that there is much confidence in the trade concerning the outlook for business from both city and country there is better demand than there was this time last year. Some lines of nuts and dried fruits are harder to obtain, and the general tendencies are to higher prices.

The sugar situation seems to be fairly normal. It was feared at first that the active on the American coast might curtail Canada sugar supplies, and rumors were even current that no Cuban stocks would be available. The menace did not prove as serious as was expected, however, and refiners have heard nothing of any limitation and expect no difficulty in getting supplies.

Toronto—A firmer undertone to the market on nuts is apparent during the week, and some arrivals during the past week or ten days show a higher range of quotations than those formerly. The new shipments of Chinese peanuts are reported at the Coast, with some that have been barred entry to United States ports being offered to Canadian buyers.

To overcome shortage of mill feeds expected towards August and September, the Ontario Government has solicited the assistance of refiners in preparing a balanced ration, using cottonseed meal, oil cake and other ingredients. Whether success will attend this effort, and the process of distribution through farmers' clubs is likely to place restrictions on the general use of this product.

The United States Government has done away with the import tariff rate on teas, which has existed since 1827. This is causing some concern, and the tea trade association has been in communication with Washington. A wire received indicates that a new rate of \$1.87 1/2 per 100 pounds for cash shipments has been fixed as against previous rate of \$4.10.

The sugar situation is considered fairly normal. Very good supplies continue to arrive, and the demand is being readily taken care of. Owing to lateness of season the demand is not very heavy as yet. The United States Food Administration have advised all canners and others using sugar for preserving purposes to cover for their season's requirements now.

Windsor—Millers report that domestic flour business is being curbed owing to the fact that the amount of flour offered to the Wheat Export Co. for delivery by the end of June shows a considerable balance undelivered. All mills have been instructed to get unshipped flour to seaboard by June 30, or 100 lbs. more than a week's stock. Domestic stocks will need replenishing in July, and millers are in hopes that wheat supplies will be sufficient to keep them operating most of next month.

The feed outlook for next fall is full of uncertainty. Mills have been selling their output and with a probable shut-down during August and September there will be no opportunity to provide a surplus stock against heavy winter demands.

Sugar supplies are coming along in splendid quantities and the demand is very heavy. It is a little too far ahead to state whether there will be sufficient sugar available for preserving purposes, but a continuation of present rate of deliveries will assure this result. An advance of 40c per 100 pounds has been made in prices by one refiner. Canadian Greener.
