A MOVING OBITUARY.

The New York Telegram, an old and steadfast friend of Kruger, and a mouthing mocker and maligner of Britain, has abandoned its ancient hero in this louching obituary:

"Of all the characters that have come to light in the emuets in South Africa, this stout-faced old Boer with the white fringes about his chin is the least adapted to glorification. For Cronje, now Napoleon to St. Helena, one may feel something of sympathy; for De Wet, the ghostly guerrilla chief who flits to and fro across the vast wastes of South Africa like a flying Dutchman of the land, striking and getting away with the skill of a lightweight champion prize fighter, it is possible to feel intense admiration; but for the president who fled from his country in its hour of danger and travail, alleged to have been laden with bags of gold, there can be no strongly developed feeling of approval."

"Kruger, indulging in the luxury of insomnia in Halversun, enriched beyond his needs and enjoying all the creature comforts, must yield himself to odious comparisons whenever he cries aloud for our tear-gone for a few kind words. He really isn't the right sort and in these later days the 'Lion of the Transvaal' as he was at times foolishly called, becomes but a many, crop-tailed, tame lion, unfit for anything more dignified than exhibition in a dime museum."

WON BY AMATEURS.

Perhaps the most gratifying feature of the extremely gratifying triumph of the Invader is the fact that the contest was by amateurs, says the Toronto Globe. The skippers and the bulk of the crews of the two yachts are men to whom sailing is a pastime and not a business, and the series of contests on Lake Michigan is proof of our possession of a fine body of men of wholesome tastes and keen energy. Yachting is expensive enough as a sport to insure the presence among the yachtsmen of a class of a number of men of considerable means; and their presence indicates a love of the sport and a willingness to participate in its labors which is in every respect to be commended. It must be confessed that we find a pleasure in the spectacle of scores of the young men of a city spending their leisure for years upon the water, acquiring such skill as was shown this week, and then contending for trophies in their own persons, and not by hired seamen; our pleasure in this spectacle is greater than in seeing a man of great wealth suddenly turn to the sport and by carte blanche orders and lavish expenditure send hired captains and hired crews to contend against other captains and other crews, also hired. It is to be regretted, in our view, that the America Cup races are not Corinthian contests; were they such, the contest would be far finer upon the ethical side, and the splendid example of Mr. Amelius Jarvis goes to show that the seamanship displayed need not be inferior.

TO SAVE THE GREAT CROPS.

Almost every man is able to do some work in the fields, be he professional or manual laborer, points out the Ottawa Citizen. Every man, and some women, should be animated by a sufficiently strong patriotic spirit to turn out into the fields to save Canada's great wheat crop. If our idle men would go at it in the right spirit there is labor enough in Canada to save to the uttermost everything that a bountiful Providence has blessed us with this year.

HELP CANADIAN INDUSTRIES.

During his recent trip to England, Sir Louis Davies, Minister of Marine, visited Paisley, Scotland, and completed the arrangements for the building of the two steamers to replace the Canadian Government revenue cruisers, Newfield and Druid, says the Brockville Times. The contracts for both vessels were signed.

A year ago proposals were made to Sir Louis by responsible parties to have those new steamers built in Nova Scotia; but he did not even answer the letter.

Some of our Canadian Ministers have a curious fashion of encouraging home industries. Hon. John Dwyer goes to Dakota to ranch in preference to seeking a place in the matchless prairies of the Canadian west; Hon. Mr. Blair goes to the U. S. to buy locomotives for the Government railway; and Sir Louis Davies has ships built in Scotland, when they could have been built at home just as well. Canadian Ministers ought to know that in assisting home industries they will have the mass of Canadian opinion to support them. (There may be a little temporary bigoted opposition which they can afford to ignore, but the general sentiment will be a feeling of approval.)
