

TO HERO'S MEMORY.

Statue of Sir Galahad to Perpetuate Deed of H. A. Harper.

Ottawa, Nov. 20.-A public monu-Ottawa, Nov. 20.—A public monument, commemorative of the heroism of the late Henry Albert Harper, formerly of Barrie, was unveiled Saturday afternoon by His Excellency Earl Grey. Thousands of citizens were present to witness the ceremony.

The monument is one of the finest pieces of bronze statuary in America and is located on the broad boulevard in front of the Parliament buildings at the head of Metcalfe street. The figure

in front of the Parliament buildings at the head of Metcalfe street. The figure is a symbolical one; it represents Sir Galahad, the young knight of the mythical court of King Arthur, who was renowned for his purity, nobility and splendid chivalry. The figure is mounted on a granite base, cut so as to represent a hugh boulder. On one side is a bronze tablet with the inscription:

"Erected by the public to commemor." "Breeted by the public to commemorate the heroism of Henry Albert Harper, M.A., who, in an effort to save the life of Miss Bessie Blair, was drowned with her in the Ottawa River

on Dec. 6, 1901, in his 28th year."

Just at the base of the figure the following legend is cut into the rock: "Galahad cried, 'If I lose myself, I save myself.'—Tennyson—The Holy Grail.'"

Grail."

The monument is the work of E. W. Keyser, a young American sculptor.

Mr. H. P. D. Ross chairman of the committee, presided. After the unveiling Mr. Ross called on W. L. Mackenzie King, who was the closest friend Mr. Harper had, to formally convey the monument to the charge of the Prime Minister.

Prime Minister.
Sir Wilfrid Laurier said it was an honor for the Government to accept it and it would be a labor of love to

Earl Grey made the closing address. He would never pass the monument without being reminded of the example without being reminded of the example bequeathed as a precious legacy. He paid a high tribute to the ability and character of the late Mr. Harper and said Canada and the world are richer by his death, as his character and example live. He hoped the monument would he but the first of a set of neble companions, which would make the street the Via Tacra of the capital.

Among those present at the ceremony were Hon. A. G. Blair, whose daughter was drowned at the same time as Mr. Harper; several Cabinet Ministers, relatives and friends from Barrie and many prominent citizens.

GAYNOR-GREENE HELD.

Four Indictments Covered by Extradi-tion Registered Against Them. Savannah, Ga., Nov. 20.—Two addi-

tional indictments charging embezzlement and receiving money of the United States that was alleged to have been embezzled by ex-Capt. Oberlin M. Carter, were returned by the Federal grand

ter, were returned by the Federal grand jury Saturday night against Benjamin D. Greene, John F. Gaynor, William T. Gaynor and Michael A. Connolly.

The two former indictments against the prisoners were for conspiracy to defraud the United States and for presenting false accounts. They were covered by the extradition charge designated in the treaty as "participation in fraud by an agent."

signated in the treaty as "participation in fraud by an agent."

The defendants were also extradicted from Canada on two other charges, which were participation in embezzlement, and for receiving money knowing to have been embezzled. As they had not previously been indicted upon the charges, Special Assistant U. S. Attorney-General Erwin thought it was wise to fortify the position of the Government by presenting the accused on the two additional charges. They now stand charged as follows: stand charged as follows:
First, conspiracy to defraud the
United States Government.
Second, presenting false accounts.

Third, embezzlement, Third, embezziement. Fourth, receiving money that belonged to the Government knowing it to be embezzled. Greene and Gaynor were present in court, having been brought from the jail under guard.

Tokio, Nov. 20.—The Japanese Prime Minister has already instructed the con-suls of Japan and Corea to take the most stringent measures to prevent any abuses taking place which might bring criticism upon the Japanese Govern-ment, and it is believed that the Corean people will be much better governed in the future. The Corean Cabinet Saturday agreed

to adopt the proposition for a Japanese protectorate over Corea, made by Marquis Ito.

Mr. Borden In Wentworth.

Stony Creek, Nov. 20.—R. I., Borden made his first appearance in the bye-election campaigns by speaking in the interests of E. D. Smith, Conservative candidate for West Wentworth, Saturcandidate for West Wentworth, Saturday night, addressing an audience that packed the town hall to the doors, every available inch of space being taken up. The candidate himself was holding another meeting at Rockton. Mr. Borden paid a worn tribute to Mr. Smith, who was one of the authorities of the House on agriculture, and a valuable man in the interests of the people. He discussed the Government's policy, and man in the interests of the people. He discussed the Government's policy, and to the pensions bill suggested an amendment in the form of an age limit. Mr. Borden also declared his entire readiness to have the indemnity, so far as in related to himself, reviewed by Parliament at the next session in the earliest possible instant. He made many strong and telling points against the Government's policy.
