New Church Dedicated.

The new Presbyterian church at Lower Horton was packed last Sunday afternoon at its dedication. The folding doors which open into the vestibule at the rear were thrown open and every available seat in the building was occupied, a good signification for successful work in the future. Rev. Dr. Forrest, President of Dalhousie College, preached the sermon, and a good, soul stirring sermon it was. The text was taken from Ephesians i, xxiii: "The Church, which is his body, the fullness of Him that fills all in all." The speaker discussed with much power what the church was and pointed out that its form and mode of government upon which some laid so much stress as essential to the true Church of Christ, were significantly lacking in the spirit of Christ's teaching. That church is the true church when most of the spirit of Christ, and in this way alone can one church vie in excellence with another in having more of His spirit. The sermon was a masterly effort and was listened to with rapt attention. At the close a liberal collection was taken up for the purpose of meeting the expenses in the erection of the church—amounting to about \$40. The Presbyterians of Lower Horton deserve great credit in the completion of their church, and it is evident from the large number who assisted them in "warming" it on Sunday afternoon that the best of feeling exists between the two denominations that worship in the neighboring village.
