## BUTTER WRAPPERS!

The cost of Vegetable Parchment from which Butter Wrappers are made has more than doubled in price since the war started. Previous to August all this paper used in America was imported from France and Germany where it was made by secret process. Since the war the source of supply is completely cut off and the only imported butter paper available since has been the stock that was in hand at the time.

An inferior quality of parchment is now made in the States and imported into Canada under a duty of 37 1/2%.

Needless to say the price of Butter Wrappers has gone away up. Plain wrappers today cost only a mere trifle less than the printed ones the law requires.

Fortunately we have still on hand a good supply of the imported stock. This is 8 1/2 inches in size and will wrap a flat or a square brick. The American wrappers are 8 1/2 and not large enough to wrap a flat brick.
