HONORABLE.—The Waterloo Observer says:—For some time past Mr. S. P. Peck and his wife, residents of Hector, Schuyler County, N. Y., have been stopping at Dr. Woodward's. On Saturday evening last, just as the 6 o'clock train was due, she left the Doctor's house. Immediately after, Mr. Peck started towards the railroad crossing on Centre street. As he neared the track he picked up something which proved to be the head of his wife, just severed from the body. Almost frantic with horrible surprise, he dropped the head and ran screaming and frenzied back to the house, where he remained all night in almost insane agony. She was a most estimable lady, thirty nine years of age, but subject to fits of despondency.

THE "MARY J. WILBER."—An examination of the brig, Mary J. Wilber by the Portwardens shows that her lower deck beams, with deck, knees, stanchions, and all attached have been torn from the sides, between the mainmast and foremast. The bulwarks are also gone on both sides opposite the main hatch, and the chain bolts started. The Captain reports the loss of several sails, some rigging, etc. The vessel is at Lloyd's blocks for repairs.

THE BRIG, "RUTH" arrived here last night from Sydney, C. B., after a voyage of twenty-three days. When she had been out eleven days everything was frozen up to such an extent, that it was deemed advisable either to run for the West Indies or to try to make Isaac's Harbor. Not having provision enough they determined to adopt the latter course. The vessel was level with the water, the water casks frozen solid, the ropes covered with ice and consequently unmanageable, one having his feet badly frost bitten and others their hands. They arrived here last night, thankful to have escaped as well as they did.—Halifax Recorder 14th.

DEATH FROM INTemperance.—An inquest was held on the 20th ult. on the body of James Leonard, found dead in a bed in the house of George Mathews, Moncton. The evidence showed that the man had been drinking heavily during the night, even taking liquor after he went to bed. The verdict was that the deceased came to his death by suffocation, the effects of whiskey.
