FULLER COMPANY  
TO BUILD FRASER  
HOSPITAL HERE

Archibald Fraser Authorizes Announcement that Contract Has Been Signed

READY FOR OCCUPANCY BY MARCH 1, 1921

11 Months Given to Complete New Hospital Building in Fredericton.

The Gleaner is authorized today to announce that the George A. Fuller Company, regarded as the largest building and construction corporation in America, with Canadian headquarters at Montreal, have signed the contract for the construction of the Fraser Memorial Hospital, which it was recently intimated would be built here this year.

Archibald Fraser, of Edmundston, authorized the announcement over the long distance telephone from Edmundston, upon his return from Montreal, where last week the formal contract was signed and arrangements made for construction work to be commenced at an early date. The provisions of the contract call for the building to be completed and ready for occupancy in ten months, which would mean March 1, 1921.

The new hospital building will be of stone, three stories in height, and will be modern in design and equipment, extensive sun parlors for convalescent patients being one of the features. The estimated cost is between \$150,000 and \$200,000. It is understood, although no definite figures have been given out. The construction of the hospital was provided for by the late Donald Fraser, Sr., who founded the business from which the present Fraser Companies, Ltd., developed.

THE NEW POSTAL

## TO PAY 6.52 PER CENT.

That Will Be Interest on the New \$2,800,000 Issue of New Brunswick Bonds.

Announcement was made today that the Provincial Government have accepted the bid of A. E. Ames & Co., Toronto; J. M. Robinson & Son, St. John; Wood, Gundy & Co., Toronto and Eastern Securities, St. John, of 95.15¢ based on interest and principal payable in Canada only on the \$2,800,000 of new Brunswick bonds, tenders for which were opened on Saturday. The rate of interest which the province will thus pay will be 6.52 per cent., this proposal being accepted rather than that for interest and principal payable in New York, which would entail payment of exchange on coupons.

It is understood that the public offering of the bonds will be made this week and that the price will be somewhat less than par.

## Buried Yesterday Afternoon.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Agnes Clark took place yesterday afternoon from the home of her daughter, Mrs. F. E. Peterson, North Devon, and was attended by many relatives and friends. Part of Eastern Canneries' Property Wanted With the Golding Stable Site.

FRED G. SPENCER WANTS NEW MOVIE HOUSE HERE

Tenders for Eastern Canneries to Be Considered by the Assignees Tomorrow.

There have been some further negotiations recently respecting the use of York street as a site for a new moving picture theatre in Fredericton, and it is understood that there is a possibility of a portion of what has been the Eastern Canneries property, formerly the Scarles provisions store, being used in that connection.

Tenders closed at noon today for the sale of the property of Eastern Canneries, Ltd., but D. W. Olts, one of the assignees, said the tenders would not be opened until tomorrow as P. F. Blanchet, of St. John, the other assignee, would not arrive until this evening. Mr. Olts admitted that Fred G. Spencer, of St. John, who has been looking over the old Golding livery stable property on York street, now owned by R. Chestnut & Sons, Ltd., as a prospective site for a theatre to replace the Gem, which was burned some months ago, has been negotiating to secure a part of the Scarles property, which with the Golding site, would provide enough room for erecting a theatre.

Mr. Olts said shortly before noon today that no tenders had been received for the property, but he expected there would be some proposals for consideration by the assignees when they confer tomorrow.

THE GOVERNMENT  
WILL MEET HERE  
NEXT THURSDAY

First Meeting Since Session of the Provincial House Was Prorogued

GENERAL ELECTIONS RUMORS ARE RECEIVED

Large Programme Including Bye-Elections to Be Discussed This Week

The first meeting of the Provincial Government since the session of the Legislature closed will be held this week, having been called for Thursday morning at 10 o'clock.

There is a pretentious array of matters for consideration by the Government, but with the meeting taking place late in the week there is some doubt as to whether all the programme can be taken up at this meeting. It is expected, however, that an appointment will be made to the chairman of the Public Utilities Commission and the important business of that body, which has been held up since the term of office of G. O. Dickson Ouy, of Hampton, as chairman, expired in April.

Whether the writ for the bye-elections will be issued is also a question.
