## Bill Sharen, Jenny H. and Gertrude Todd Show Well

### Former New Brunswick Stars Shape Up Promisingly in Training Activities--Bill Sharen in Brusie's Stable at Hartford--Jenny H. and Gertrude Todd in Rodney Stable at Springfield.

Boston, Mass., April 28.—The trotters and pacers which are to race this year are so well forward in their preparation that the training grounds have taken on for the railbirds a mid-spring attractiveness that is unusual, writes Frank G. Troit in the Boston Globe.

Miles faster than 2.20 in April are not common in New England, but already they will touch 2.16 at Hartford, where Will Crozier is getting some of his horses ready for the first call.

Last Thursday morning Will worked Harris Axtell, Hollywood Frisco, Sparkle and Phil O'Neill in 2.16. Friday he stepped the two-year-old Billy, Miss Etta, by Chestnut Peter, in 2.30.

Bill Sharen worked in 2.22 1/2.

Harry Brusie gave the horses in his stable an airing Friday morning. Charles Direct, Bill Sharen, and Kasoff worked in 2.23 1/2, last half in 1.07, and the last quarter in 32 seconds.

Binland Jr. has been in 2.30 since he arrived from Ohio. His owner, John H. Dillon, has also purchased the five-year-old mare Miss Binland, 2.13 1/2, by Binland. She will be shipped east in a few days.

Mr. Dillon has also purchased from Fred Holsappel of Copake, N. Y., a half interest in Tippi Volo, Purple Volo and Neill Volo, the three two-year-olds now in Brusie's stable. Tippi Volo has been in 2.32 1/2 over the Hamilton track and Purple Volo in 2.35, the last quarter of the trip being trotted in 35 seconds. Neill Volo was gelded a few weeks ago. He will start training again this week.

### Rodney's Promising Stable.

Aubrey Rodney and Art Martin have a nice lot of horses in their respective stables at the Eastern Exposition track. During the winter weather Rodney put in considerable work on Commodore Wilson with which he reduced the 3-year-old record for geldings to 2.08 1/2 at Syracuse last September.

In 1924 the Commodore failed at times to come up to expectations. He was a speed marvel which could not be controlled except in his few starts on mile tracks. At present he acts like a family horse being driven to a cart without a check.

Last July after being distanced at Windsor, Commodore Wilson trotted the half-mile track in 2.08. At Reading in August he defeated Rachel. This summer he will be asked to meet Clyde the Great and The Great Volo. Both of them are rated as tall timber but if Commodore Wilson has perfect racing manners he will give a good account of himself even against that pair.

Wilson Express, the half brother of Commodore Wilson, is being prepared by Rodney's other pupils include Clover Guy, Jenny H., Pirella Scott, Miss Muffet, Lou Abbe, William Worthy, Gertrude Todd and Lucky Frisco. Clover Guy is a substantial looking bay horse by Guy Arworthy out of Lucky Clover, which Fox and Cox raced. He was started in a few races last season, and made a time record of 2.07 1/2. Lucky Frisco is by San Francisco out of the dam of Clover Guy.

Jenny H. and Gertrude Todd.

The Hedgewood boy mare, Jenny H., looks like ready money this spring. She has been engaged all the way down the line and may create a lot of trouble in the 2.10 classes before the sulkers are hung up next fall. John H. Dillon of New Haven, Conn., has purchased her sister, Amy

K., which joined Rod's stable last week.

Pirella Scott is a sister to Peter Wooster. She won two out of 15 starts last year, but is expected to do a little better in 1925. Gertrude Todd is one of Will Keyes' western selections. He purchased her out of Henry Hawkins' stable at Springfield, Ill., after she had made a time record of 2.08. Last year Keyes raced her in Maine and New Brunswick where he never failed to get the money, and also won six races. Gertrude Todd is by Todd Mask out of the dam Supenaro, 2.07 1/2. She has perfect manners and is apt to be an important factor of the New England half-mile tracks this year.

## GEO. A. M'SHAYNE HAS FINE STABLE

Vermont Horseman Well Known on Maine & N. B. Circuit at St. Johnsbury.

Much is expected of Mirabelle, 2.24 1/2, a brown mare by Atlantic Express, 2.07 1/2, out of Esther Belle, 2.08 1/2.

The no-record trotters include Lelona Todd by Echo Todd, 2.14 1/2. Her dam Lelona is by Blingen and is also the dam of Lelona, 2.09 1/2.

Followed by ill-fortune as a four-year-old that worked fast, she was bred to Pony Express, last year.

King Garner, a chestnut gelding by John Garner, 2.08 1/2, his first dam by Peter the Great, 2.07 1/2. This horse showed well last fall and is expected to take a mark under 2.20 this summer.

Peter Cleave, 16 hands high and weighing better than 1100, is a bay gelding by Peter the Great, 2.07 1/2, out of Phyllis, 2.04 1/2, by Alieewood, 2.09 1/2. Handsome and clever, this powerful horse after being sick last summer showed 2.19, and seems like a real prospect.

Two broodmares, Donna Belle W., 2.13 1/2, by Peter O'Donna, 2.08, and Molly Brooks, by Dreamlife, both in foal by Pony Express, 2.12 1/2, and yearling, Samuel Craft by Pony Express out of Donna Belle W., complete the list.

A half dozen other trainers are expected to occupy quarters at the park in the near future.
