General Intelligence
LABOR NOT SO WELL.

THE X-RAY OPERATION CAUSED A HIGH
FEVER.

RENNES, Aug. 17.—Labori passed a
bad night. The fever resulting from the
x-ray operation causing much trouble.
His physicians are now undecided

THESE FAVORABLE DIRECTIONS.

RENNES, Aug. 17.—At the resumption
of the Dreyfus session this morning Gen
Bogert finished his testimony which has
been nothing but a long speech
with an argument with M. Demange in
the witness list some of his
assurances.

The next witness M. Bertulus was the
first witness to testify in favor of the
prisoner. Bertulus was the examining
magistrate, whose signature of the papers
in the house of M. M. Pays, Esterhazy
nurses led to the belief of the guilt of
Col. Henry. Bertulus testified as to
Henry's famous confession while being
examined. He told how he examined
all the evidence in the case and con-
cluded by absolutely saying that there
was no indication of the guilt of Drey-
fus. He gave the grand jury a running
of Esterhazy's connection with the
Bordeaux.

The next witness was Lieut. Col.
Piquart, who spoke clearly, frankly
and with a very bold demeanor. He
said as head of the secret intelligence
bureau, he was asked by Gen. Dubiel-
let to find a motive for the treachery of
Dreyfus. In 1896 after the prisoner's
conviction he was first led to believe
Dreyfus innocent when he found a post
card torn to pieces which was taken from
the waste basket at the German Embassy
which bore Esterhazy's name. On in-
quiries he found that Esterhazy was
often having documents copied. His
reporting his discoveries and when war
minister Cavaignac ordered an investiga-
tion of Esterhazy the witness said
Esterhazy was informed of it. Shortly
after this Col. Piquart was sent to Tunis
on a dangerous mission. Piquart said
the resemblance of Dreyfus' handwriting
to the handwriting of Esterhazy was
so great that he was able to keep himself
out of the case.

The inquest of the last remark
caused a sensation and the court here
adjourned until tomorrow when
Col. Piquart continues.

FILIPINOS ATTACKED.
AFTER A HOT FIGHT THEY ABANDONED
THEIR TRENCHES AND RETREATED.

MANILA, Aug. 24. m.—The twelfth
infantry left Manila at sunrise to-day
and advanced up the railway. Captain
Evans' battalion deployed to the right of
the track and Captain Wood's to the
left. Two companies remained on the
track with the artillery. The insurgents
were found well entrenched in front of
the town, their trenches having been dug
within a few days and since the occupa-
tion of Manila. At a distance of 40-500
yards the Filipinos opened fire. Their
force was estimated by Col. Smith as
about 1,000 men. The Philippine army
said it exceeded those figures by a
thousand. The enemy sent heavy vol
