## Bathurst News

During the past week the weather has been unusually cold and backward proving detrimental to the driving operations which are now making very slow progress. The ground still retains much frost and in no shape for putting in seed, and in no doubt very little will be attempted at farming before another fortnight.

On the subject of seeds for planting the prices are likely to average the same as last year, while white and black seed oats are selling at 50c a bushel in comparison with 60c. per bushel last season. Potatoes for planting purposes will be much higher than last spring clover seed is also higher, with timothy about the same as last season, however it will be no surprise if the market for these lines becomes more active once planting begins and fine weather is general. We think that very few oats and potatoes are held in store here now and it is quite natural to expect that prices will be well maintained. The lumber drive on Bass River arrived in the boom yesterday and is the first drive in. We understand the lumber in this stream belongs to Messrs Adams Burns & Co. and Messrs O. F. Stacey & Co.
