MARKETS and FINANCE

TORONTO MARKETS.

LIVE STOCK. The receipts of live stock at the City Market, as reported by the railways, since last Friday, were 78,000, composed of 123 cattle, 106 hogs on the market, and 272 sheep sold on cars, 647 sheep and lambs and 90 calves.

The quality of fat cattle was about the same as before, and no worse than the general run lately.

There was a fair trade for the best quality of cattle, but prices were no better, and in fact, not so good for the common quality. The meat families are certainly a long way off, as several loads of cattle were unsold at the close of the market.

Exporters-Only one load of exporters were sold as such. They were bought by Alex. McIntosh at \$5.20 per cwt. Export bullocks sold at \$1 to \$4.20 per cwt.

Butchers-Choice picked lots, and loads of butchers sold at \$1.25 to \$1.50 per cwt. Loads of good at \$1.20 to \$1.30; medium \$1.10 to \$1.20; common \$1.00 to \$1.10; cows \$1 to \$1.25 per cwt.; rams \$1 to \$1.50 per cwt.

Feeders and stockers-None on sale as such. Milkers and springers-About 20 milkers and springers sold at \$1.50 to \$2.00 each. A few common light cows, which are hard sellers, brought 80 cents.

Veal calves-About 60 veal calves sold at \$4 to \$7 per cwt.; a few good calves sold at \$10 to \$12 per cwt. The market was strong for calves of the right kind.

Sheep and lambs-The market for sheep and lambs was strong to-day. Export sheep sold at \$1 to \$1.50; yearling ewes and wethers, for butcher purposes, sold at \$1.20 to \$1.50; rams, \$2.50 to \$4 per cwt.; lambs sold from \$1.50 to \$2.75, the latter price being paid for selected lots of county points, f.o.b. cars.

Hog-Mr. Harris quoted hog prices unchanged at \$13.50, fed and watered, \$14.50 to drovers. F. county points, f.o.b. cars.

FARMERS' MARKET.

The receipts of grain show a considerable increase, but prices are unchanged. Wheat steady, with sales of 500 bushels of all grades, at 70c a bushel. Oats unchanged, 300 bushels, at 27c a bushel.

Hay in abundant supply and weaker, a few being sales of 40 loads at \$19 to \$21 a ton. Dressed hogs are more plentiful, with light quoted at \$7.75 and heavy at \$7.25.
