(Special Wire to the Times.) Cobalt, Ont., Nov. 2.—The first pros-pectors who walked out from Whitney and Tisdale townships arrived in town today from the scene of the latest gold rush. The lakes and rivers along the route froze last Thursday, but owing to the warmer weather this week it is thought the route can be kept open for a few days yet.

Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a fam-ily, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in per-son at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency of the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sis-ter. In certain conditions a homesteader is good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months each of six years from date of homesteaded entry including the time required to earn home-stead patent and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted the home-stead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

Was Inoculated From Dog Which Bit Dundas Boy.

Council Enters Into Contract With Telephone Company.

Engineer Barrow Reports on Sewer System For Town.

Dundas, Nov. 2.—The November meeting of the Town Council was held last evening. The members present were Mayor Lawason, Reeve Lawson, Deputy Reeve Spittal and Councillors Pennington, Bertram, Boyle, Mount, Moses and Lunn.

J. W. Dickson, W. H. Moss and R. Maitlin's applications for water were referred to the Fire and Water Com-mittee.

Paling Bros' application for renewal of their moving picture house was left over until next meeting.

J. G. Rutherford, Ottawa, wrote that the rabbit inoculated from the dog's head had died with rabies. This led the Mayor to announce that dogs must still be confined.

The Dundas Electric Company wrote that to install additional street lights, as requested, would cause a heavy ex-penditure, and the company, therefore, asked that the Council enter into an agreement for five years. No action was taken.

The Board of Works reported that re-pairs on Sydenham street had cost \$533; on Cross street, \$300; total, \$833; paid by county, \$700, leaving to be paid by town, \$133. The report was adopted.

The Finance Committee recommended the purchase of the building known as the Barton castle for an isolation hos-pital, which could be purchased for \$1,500. Rev. Mr. Potter, James Kyle and Frank Barker were present in opposition to the proposal. Councillor Pennington con-tended that there was no danger to neighbors from infection. Councillor Bertram said that he had property near by, and much preferred a hospital there than having the building used for a dwelling for undesirable foreigners. The Council decided that the property should be secured at once. The Board of Health approved of the site and the Council was quite unanimous regarding it.

Engineer Barrow reported that he saw no engineering difficulty in the way of installing a sewer system and sewage disposal tanks in the town. The matter was referred back to special sewage com- mittee for consideration.

A by-law authorizing an agreement between the town and the Bell Tele- phone Co. was put through its final stages and received the corporate seal. The agreement provides that the com- pany shall have a monopoly of the tele- phone business of the town for four years from August last. This agree- ment differs from the former agree- ment principally in that it provides some ad- ditional free telephones for use of town officials, and that it provides that the town shall be recouped from any dam- ages or cost the town may suffer owing to carelessness or neglect of the com- pany's employees or officials.

ABUSED BRIDE.

Baronet Shunned His Wife on Their Honeymoon.

Strange Story of a Baronet's Con-duct After Marriage.

London, Nov. 2.—In the Divorce Court, last week, before Mr. Justice Baggavars Deane, a case was heard in which Lady Emily Frances Stirling, formerly Lady De Lisle and Dudley, sued for a divorce from Sir Walter Stirling, Bart., of Lennox Gardens, London, on the ground of cruelty and misconduct. The suit was undefended.

Mr. Bernard, K. C. (with whom was Mr. J. H. Murphy), appeared for the petitioner, and in opening the case said that the marriage took place in July, 1908, at St. George's, Hanover Square. The parties afterwards lived at Lennox Gardens and other places. Petitioner, at the time of the marriage, was the widow of Lord De Lisle and Dudley. From the date of the marriage the husband had treated his wife with the greatest cruelty and neglect. On the day of the marriage, in leaving the church, he said to her, "You have a cold, and you are going abroad for your health, and shall start to-morrow. If you are not well enough I shall go alone."

On that day they travelled down to Dover, and he refused to speak to his wife. The next day they went to Paris, and he still refused to speak to her. They stayed there a few days, and he absolutely neglected her. When she tried to make herself pleasant he simply ignored her. They went to other places on the Continent, where the same kind of conduct took place, and on two or three occasions he told his wife he should leave her.

On June 9, 1903, after they had returned to London, they had been to a wedding reception together. Sir W. Stirling told his wife that he wanted to speak to her. He said that if she did not leave the house he would put her into a room at the top of the house, and keep her there, and tell her friends that she was mad. The effect of his conduct was that Lady Stirling's health was affected, and Dr. Beresford Riley, who had known her for years, would say that he knew her when she was a strong, healthy woman twelve years ago, and that he was shocked at the change in her.

On June 10, Lady Stirling left her husband. There was a deed of separation in July, 1903. Subsequently, Sir George Stirling was watched, and he was traced to the Great Central Hotel, where he stayed with a lady, and they passed as Mr. and Mrs. Stirling.

Lady Stirling corroborated counsel's statement.

Mr. Bernard—Hod did your husband treat you?

Lady Stirling—He hardly took any notice of me at all. He did not speak to me.

Did he answer you at all when you spoke?—No, only to make sarcastic replies.

Did you ask him at Dover what was the matter?—Yes. He said he would not tell me then, but he might tell me later. On the way from Dover to Calais he said that marriage was very bad for him, and that it would be better for him to go his way, and for me to go mine.

At Paris, continued Lady Stirling, he went out at night and I hardly saw anything of him. When he came in to lunch and dinner he did not speak to me. I tried to make myself pleasant, but he would not speak to me except to say very insulting things. As a rule he never spoke at all.

Did this upset you?—Very much. About a fortnight after the marriage, said Lady Stirling, she was not well, and stayed in bed to breakfast. Sir Walter Stirling went down to breakfast, but came back soon afterwards. He burst into the room, and was very angry. He took hold of the bed and shook it violently, and said, "What horrible disgusting things women are."

After they returned to Lennox Gar-dens he asked if she had sold the house in Park street, where she formerly lived, and had said, "I wish you would go back there, because I don't want you here."

Very often at meals he said, "D— you, I don't want to hear you roar." She wished to invite some lady friends to the house, and he said, "I don't want
