ATTEMPT TO DYNAMITE AMERICAN NAVY YARDS

New York, Aug. 27—A despatch from Philadelphia says: As the cruiser Tennessee was weighing anchor yesterday to take the artillery battalion of the marine corps to Haiti, it became known that three sticks of dynamite had been found in the League Island navy yards big dry dock in which the auxiliary cruiser Prairie is now being overhauled.

Workmen told of what apparently was an attempt to wreck the huge dry dock. Had the dynamite exploded, both docks and the Prairie would have suffered serious damage.

Extra precautions had been taken to guard the yard and bluejackets with revolvers kept all visitors from the docks. The guards kept a close watch on all visitors.
