The Application of Ground and Dried Sea Weed

When, on account of war conditions and the consequent scarcity of German potash, efforts were being made to secure potash from other sources, the Experimental Farms made a test of the use of seaweed as a source of potash. To put this material into a portable and commercial form it had to be dried and ground. This work was done in an experimental way on the Nova Scotia coast and some of the product was sent to the Fredericton Station for test.

Both field and plot tests were made with potatoes—

In the field test an area with an application of 1000 lbs. of a 4-10 fertilizer per acre and no seaweed gave 178 bushels per acre. A similar area with the same amount of the same fertilizer and 1500 lbs. of ground seaweed gave 230 bushels per acre. A third area with 18 tons stable manure and 750 lbs. seaweed per acre gave 242 bushels per acre, and a fourth area with 18 tons per acre of stable manure alone gave 232 bushels per acre. Green mountain potatoes were grown and it was noticed that the plants on the seaweed area stood up greener later in the season than where no potash was applied.

Calculating the cost of the seaweed at \$15.00 per ton, for which it was stated it could be landed at Fredericton, there was a credit of 52 bushels for the 1500 lbs. of seaweed used where only commercial fertilizer was applied. As the seaweed cost but \$11.25 and the extra potatoes were worth at least \$1.00 per bushel this test showed a splendid profit from the use of the seaweed.

When stable manure was used however the increase of only ten bushels per acre for 750 lbs. of seaweed showed only a profit of \$1.38 indicating that the potash in the stable manure supplied the needs of the crop to a considerable extent, and emphasizing the value of stable manure for the potato crop as against a non-potash commercial fertilizer. The following year on the oat crop there was no practical difference as between the different applications—nor was any difference noticeable in the succeeding clover crop.

In the plot tests of one-tenth acre each with Empire State potatoes, seaweed at the rate of 1000 lbs. per acre gave a yield of 255 bushels per acre and at the rate of 2000 lbs per acre, 257 bushels per acre, while the check plot with no fertilizer whatever gave 192 bushels per acre. The succeeding wheat crop was so badly diseased with Glume spot that the yield was almost negligible and not at all to be relied upon for a satisfactory test. Seaweed at the rate of 1000 lbs. per acre gave 9 bushels and 20 lbs. per acre, at the rate of 2000 lbs., 7 bushels and 40 lbs, while the check plot gave 5 bushels and 30 lbs. per acre.

While the above data are of too limited a scope from which to draw comprehensive conclusions, the evidence, so far as it goes, shows that if seaweed can be dried and ground and transported for \$15.00 per ton, it would have a place, and a profitable place among fertilizing materials.

Near the shore where the seaweed can be had for the hauling its almost universal use with satisfactory results confirms its value as a fertilizer.

Conference Splits on Collective Bargaining

Collapse of the Industrial Conference upon the language of a resolution indorsing what is known as collective bargaining "serve to bring the attention of the public to one phase of the long-standing struggle between employers and employed apparently not clearly understood. Out of this lack of understanding has risen criticism of the employers' group in the conference. Effort is made to blame that group for the failure of the conference. What are the facts?

The question of "collective bargaining" and closed shop first came before the United States Supreme Court for judicial determination in the case of Coppage vs. Kansas in January, 1915. The Kansas Legislature passed a law prohibiting an employer from making a condition of employment that the employee shall not join a labor union. The court by a vote of 6 to 3 upheld the law. On December 10, 1917, the United States Supreme Court handed down an opinion in the case of Hitchman Coal and Coke Company vs. Mitchell in which the majority of six Justices said:—

"Whatever may be the advantages of collective bargaining, it is not bargaining at all, in any just sense, unless it is voluntary on both sides."

On April 8, 1918, President Wilson created the War Labor Board. The first of the "Declarations of Principles" adopted by this Board was:—"The right of workers to organize in trades unions and to bargain collectively through chosen representatives is recognized and affirmed." Former President Taft and Frank P. Walsh were the first joint chairmen of the board. Every decision of this Board settling disputes between employers and employees conceded to organized labor "during the period of war" the right of collective bargaining. This concession was directly opposed to the decisions of State and federal courts, and was recognized as a war emergency measure. The close of the war brought employers and employees face to face with court decisions on the one hand and War Labor Board decisions on the other. Naturally organized labor demanded "no backward step" from the War Labor Board decisions. Employers stood on the decisions of the courts.

It is unfortunate that the Industrial Conference could not reach a harmonious conclusion on this question. However, it is neither fair nor just to blame any group for the failure. The difficulty lies in the interpretation of "collective bargaining." After the labor group left the conference the employers' group was invited to leave. The final act was the statement issued by the employers' group indorsing "collective bargaining," provided it is defined clearly as to its applicability. This statement of the employers' group calls attention to the fact that "the right of collective bargaining is interpreted by the labor group in one way and one way only."

.....The effort was to commit the conference to support this brand of bargaining."

The tone and language of the statement of the employers' group to the public is fair and calm. It absolves that group from the responsibility of failure to reach a common ground. At the same time it offers no solution of the problem, which may require additional decisions of the Supreme Court made in the light of existing industrial conditions.

Profit and Loss on The Poultry Plant

The profit or loss on the poultry plant—more than in any other department on the farm—depends on attention to details.

The poultry keeper who does things in the usual way very often makes as fair profit but it is the poultry keeper who carefully attends to the little things that make the greatest success.

With the ever increasing cost of production every possible source of revenue should be developed. The high class of table egg—infertile—put up in neat packages to command a few cents per dozen over the ordinary new laid; the early hatched chicks to have well matured pullets for winter layers; the early hatched cockerels, other than those required for breeding purposes, properly finished and marketed as broilers; the later hatched chicks had for roasters, crate fatted and sold at a time when the market is not glutted; the hens, culled, fattened and sold early in the season at the time of high prices; besides these usual sources of revenue, attention should be paid to the eggs for hatching, and the day-old chick business. These branches and particularly the latter offer great fields for development.

The best of the hens that are not required for next year's breeding may be sold for breeders at a considerable advance over the price that could be obtained for table poultry.

It is by paying special attention to the putting of the product up in an attractive form that the profit is increased. The extra few cents per dozen for the eggs and the increase in price for stocks is just so much more profit. In crate feeding not only is the weight being increased, but the quality, as well, so that a higher price per pound may be secured.

A little carelessness at any time of the year may prove disastrous to profits. Incubator lamp is not properly trimmed or the incubator regulator is knocked out of adjustment—Result—a poor hatch. The brooder stove is overlooked some night—Result—a lot of chilled chicks. The poultry house is not disinfected regularly in hot weather—Result—a house infested with mites—a flock without production. The hens are not culled and half of them are either low or non-producers—Result—the profit produced by the layers used to support the non-layers. There are one hundred and one ways in which the profit may be turned into loss and it is only constant attention to the apparently little things that success is assured.
