in this matter, as in others. Mr. Yeo called attention to the manner in which Sir John Macdonald and Sir Charles Tupper had tried to delude the people of his province at last election, and demanded that the terms of Confederation be revised on this or any other session of the House.
Mr. Malcol called upon the Government to explain the grave charges preferred by Engineer Palmer against Senator Howland. These charges meant that a member of Parliament had been speculating with public money and violating the independence of the Parliament Act.
Sir Richard Cartwright said that the duty of the Finance Minister to explain all expenditures of public money. The Government apparently made Senator Howland an election agent, and when he was defeated they reappointed him to the Senate.
Mr. Foster said that the matter was a dispute between parties outside the House and the Government had nothing to do with the financial arrangements made by Palmer or any other contractor. He denied that Senator Howland had gone to London as an agent of the Government to interview Sir Douglas Fox. Senator Howland had not been promised re-appointment to the Senate when he resigned to run for election. The Government had tried to keep itself clear of the dispute, but it was not intended to be a party to it, and that protection could only be justified to the extent of the benefits to the people and the stability of the Dominion which it imposed. Taking Mr. Colby's speech of 1878 as the most exact statement of the expectations of the promoters of the project, Mr. McCarthey pointed out that the National Policy would create a home market for farmers and prevent competition from putting up the price of the goods.
