LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

The coldest snap of the season was experienced here on Sunday night when the thermometer fell to the freezing point.

Rev. Dr. MORRISON left here on Monday morning last, on a two weeks vacation, during which he will visit the principal Canadian cities.

ALFRED C. McWILLIAMS, a native of this Province, was hanged at Salem, Mass., on Friday morning last, for the murder of an Italian named Gullio.

The appointment of Gordon Hunter to the vacancy caused by the removal of Gold Commissioner Fawcett has been officially announced from Ottawa.

In the St. Louis races of Thursday last between John R. Gentry and Joe Pat when the latter won in two straight heats, time 2:07 and 2:07.

THERE is much excitement in Bookport, Maine over the murder of Mrs. Sarah Wace, maiden name Sarah McDonald and formerly of Cape Breton, whose body was found in a clump of bushes last week.

On Friday night last, Mr. George F. Powers arrived in the city for the purpose of making his annual collection tour of the Island in behalf of the Frederick Deaf and Dumb Institution.

The funeral of the late Francis Monaghan took place Sunday afternoon. It was attended by the Benevolent Irish Society, headed by the League of the Cross Band and a large number of other citizens.

A WINNIPEG despatch of the 9th says \$25,000 in negotiable notes and \$37,000 in bills were stolen from Molson's bank of that city. No clue to the thief had been discovered at last accounts.

A light snowfall is reported to have fallen in St. Paul on the 8th inst., and a heavy snowstorm is said to have been taking place on that date in Foston, Aitken, Hallock, and a number of northern Minnesota points.

A SHANGHAI despatch of the 8th inst., says that a fire broke out at Hankow on Sunday previous by which many lives were lost, 10,000 houses destroyed and damage to the extent of from seven to eleven million dollars was done.

It was announced by Senator Fairbanks at Quebec, on the 5th inst., that an adjournment of the international commission would take place on Monday, October 10th, and that the sessions would be resumed on November 1st, at Washington.

HON. SHERMAN HOAR, died of typhoid fever at his home at Concord, Mass., on Tuesday last week. He contracted his illness while making a tour of the Southern camps as agent of the Massachusetts Volunteers and association. He was about 58 years of age.

A ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., despatch of the 10th says the proprietor of the Evening Telegram, Mr. Herder and the editor Mr. Parsons have each received thirty days imprisonment for contempt of court, October 10th, for having advised criticism of the Judges of the Supreme Court.

OWING to Italy's financial straits, the Minister of Marine has renounced the sweeping naval programme involving an expenditure of 540,000,000 lire, and will be satisfied with a naval credit this year of 280,000,000 lire. A ministerial crisis is thus averted.

It is reported that the Gaucos, a steamer of 1,400 tons net, is ashore at Ferrale, Newfoundland, and a total loss. She was bound for Aberdeen from Montreal and laden with a cargo of flour, cheese, cattle, etc. She went ashore on the 3rd and at last accounts was fast breaking up. The insurance on the cargo was \$150,000.

An Ottawa despatch of the 7th says the batch of bye-elections to have been pulled off the end of this month, are deferred to about November 10th, much to the disgust of the Ontario organizer, Smith, who had been there a week trying to have the original arrangements carried out.

The seventeen-year-old son of the late Postmaster Jeremiah W. Corneay of Boston while engaged in a game of football a few days ago, had his neck twisted and his leg paralyzed by four or five men of his own and eleven of the opposing team falling upon him during a scrimmage. He subsequently died at the City Hospital from the effect of his injuries.

The Calendar of Princes of Wales College and Normal School for 1898-99, just laid on our table is a handsome pamphlet of 66 pages from the press of John Coombs & Co. It contains the names of the College faculty; the examination papers for 1898, the names of the students attending during the last term and much other information about the institution.

A NEW WAGMINSTER, B. C. paper, recently to hand, contains the names of the members of the different committees formed for the relief of the sufferers by the disastrous fire. We are pleased to observe that our esteemed friends, Messrs. B. C. and J. M. McDonald, formerly of this Province occupy places on these committees.

On Saturday night last about eleven o'clock Miss Catherine McKinnis, a highly esteemed lady, and sister of Mr. Frank McKinnis of Queen Street, was suddenly taken ill of heart disease and died almost immediately. She had been to the Church and to confession in the afternoon and although in delicate health had made no complaint of more than ordinary fatigue. Her funeral took place on Tuesday morning and was largely attended.

A MISHAP to the steamer Luonnia occurred when she was 40 miles west of Fastnet rock. Owing to the heavy sea running she only exchanged despatches at Queenstown on the 7th, and took her passengers and mail on to Liverpool. At Kinale Head the Luonnia signalled that she had broken her starboard intermediate piston rod and was proceeding at half speed with the aid of her port engine.

The Government is varying the festivities at Quebec by appointing commissioners. The latest commission launched is one on lotteries. Of it Mr. Archibald Currie, of Souris, and Mr. Stephen E. Gallant, of Egmont Bay, are prominent members. This commission is to be participative in its methods, and will no doubt have much to report as to travelling expenses.
