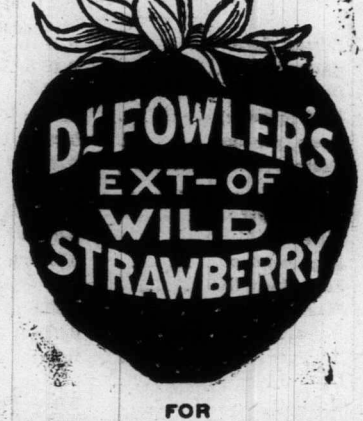

The Individual Soul.

There is no subject, under that of God, more suited to the contemplation and study of man than the soul that he possesses. At the old Church of Saints Anselm and Ocellin, in Lincoln's Inn Field's, London, a few Sundays ago, the Rev. David Dimford, delivered a beautiful sermon on the "Individual Soul Created by God." Having defined the soul, and drawn distinctions between vegetable, animal and human life, the preacher spoke in the following graphic and convincing terms of the soul:—

"Man was able to choose whether he would do this or that; the tree had to grow just as God made it grow; and the shrub, the flowers, and the animals had no power except that of instinct. Man had the power of free will, and he (the rev. preacher) wanted them to note this distinction between animals, flowers, and fruits, and themselves—that as the soul, or principle of life of the former was corruptible and died, man's soul, the intellectual power he had in his nature, was incorruptible and could not die. Was there anyone present there who did not believe he had a soul? If so, he had better go to a doctor specially skilled in mental diseases. Let them consider for a moment the beauty and splendor of the immortal soul which God had given them. Adam's soul was a reflection of the soul of Almighty God. God had existed from all eternity, and He wished those beings He created to take the place of the fallen angels. Now, the fallen angels were a reflection of the beauty of Almighty God, and therefore the beings whom God placed on earth to replace the fallen angels were a reflection of the beauty and splendor of Almighty God.

Adam unfortunately fell, and his soul had a certain amount of shadow cast upon it, but that was no reason why they should not raise their souls from that state of shadow to the state of Almighty God wished them to be in. He could not go into all the gifts Almighty God gave to the soul of Adam, he could only comprise them in the gifts of memory, understanding, and will. Take the gift of memory. Did they endeavor to remember all that Almighty God had done for them? Did they try and understand what Almighty God was doing for them; did they with their will endeavor to follow that out?

What had God done for them? Created their memory, given them a will, and given them their understanding, so that they knew them if they followed out His and their will, if they were determined to correspond with the will of Almighty God. There was the whole secret, not only of Orthodoxy, but of eternity. Almighty God would have undergone all His suffering for the sake of one individual soul. There was one thing that would convince them as to the importance of their own souls, and that was to take a walk through a cemetery. Let them go to the poorer part, where the bodies were buried in graves of mud. Let them ask themselves where were all those souls. If God made those bodies beautiful, if God made those bodies looked upon by others as beautiful, and if He allowed them to rest there in clay, they might well ask—where are the souls? They knew how people hid away jewels, how they hid away their souls. They might have beautiful bodies, they might have features of good shape, but Almighty God had made the soul of man to be hidden away completely from the view of other men. So was the soul of Mary, the mother of all Christians, hidden away.

Let them ever have Mary in their hearts; let them cherish her, and let us upon her not only as their mother guide, and protector, but look upon her as their friend and helper. If they did not love Mary, if there was one amongst them that did not look upon Mary as their mother and protector, he could only say God help that soul."

The deceased was born in Zwickenberg, Carinthia, and having made his studies with the Franciscan Fathers in Bosen, Tyrol, entered the Capuchin Convent in 1833, and in 1833 left for the mission at Battiah, India. He soon mastered the languages of this country and spoke the Hindoo with such perfection that scarcely a trace of foreign accent could be noticed. His zeal knew no bounds. Alone and unprotected, he went from place to place, barefooted and wearing the coarse habit of the order, but only upon saving souls.

miles or more further north, where the mission has a house, and where he took provision and money for a priest, Father Jeremia, who was there alone. He soon parted with his coolies, who lagged behind, and pursued his walk alone, on an un-frequented road, which for the last five or six years is a mere footpath through hilly jungles, with high, rank grass. He had with him his watch, fifty rupees, and an old muzzle-loading gun with the muzzle broken, which he was taking to the showkidar on Sameswar Hill.

Father Cosmas must have been attacked, knocked down and carried into the grass when he was about two miles from the mission house and at ten minutes past 2 o'clock in the afternoon; for his watch was found to have stopped at that hour. The ground, when examined afterwards showed where his feet had slipped, and a dent in the earth showed where his gun had fallen. The long grass showed plainly where the tiger, or tigress as the natives say it may have been, dragged its victim for some thirty feet to a log of wood, where a pool of blood indicated that the beast had stopped and torn the body. There were also signs that a cub had there joined the tigress. The coolies reached the spot about 5 o'clock, and found the priest's hat, gun and one shoe; and they also noticed the trampled grass and the blood already mentioned. Hastening up the hill to the house, they informed Father Jeremia, who had a gang of work people under him. He immediately collected these men and went to the place with a gun and torches, for darkness was setting in. But although they searched till 11 o'clock, they found nothing except Father Cosmas' other shoe, and the parcel in which he carried his breviary and money.

Next morning the search was renewed and by daylight it was easy to see where the body had been dragged two miles through the jungle and over a hill. But about midway in this distance, that is, one mile from the path, the father's clothes were torn to shreds, with a large quantity of blood, and one of his bones all of which proved that the tigress had there stopped and partly devoured the body. A mile further on, the mangled remains were found, with the head and face little injured; and in a scrap of clothing which was still attached to the fragments of the corpse, was the father's watch. All that remained was gathered together in a native blanket and carried to Rungger, where the corpse in its mangled state was clothed in white linen and a priest's habit, and conveyed to Battiah. It was the first intimation to the priests and native converts of the mission there of what had taken place, and caused a great exhibition of grief and horror.
