## Fogota's Rough and Tedious Run.

The s.s. Fogota, Capt. Baxter Bar-  
bour, arrived here at 5 p.m. yester-  
day after one of the most stormy and  
tedious trips in the captain's experi-  
ence. She brought a full cargo of  
300 packages of fish, mostly casks,  
and a lot of oil on deck. The ship  
left here on Wednesday week at 10:30  
p.m. and arrived at Catalina at 7 a.m.  
Thursday. Leaving there at 11 o'clock  
she proceeded to Bonavista and  
Greenpond, arriving at the latter  
place 6 p.m. Friday. She arrived at

Wesleyville at midnight, remained un-  
til 10 a.m. next day discharging  
freight, after which it became very  
stormy and the ship had a hard night  
of it, arriving at Gander Bay at 7  
a.m. Sunday. While there a N.E.  
gale blew with heavy snow, and the  
ship did not reach Dog Bay until 1:45  
p.m. She called at Seldom shortly  
after, it being too rough to call at  
Indian Islands. She left at 10:15  
Sunday night to go to Fogot, but it  
was so bad that the ship in a blind-  
ing snow storm could not get through  
Stag Harbor Run and anchored at  
Man-o-War Cove until daylight Mon-  
day. She reached Fogot at 1:30 this  
morning, and leaving at 11:30 pro-  
ceeded to Change Islands and left at

3:30 p.m. for Fogot. It was too stormy  
to call at Joe Batt's Arm or Tilton,  
and the ship remained at Seal Cove  
all Monday night until the mists  
could be brought overland from these  
places. She called at Indian Islands  
coming back and landed the freight  
on board for there. Returning south  
she arrived at Victoria Cove at 3:15  
p.m. Despite the storm, raging she  
steamed all night until she arrived  
at Carmanville at daylight. A raging  
blizzard almost prevented the ship  
from making Ladle Cove and Mis-  
grave, but as Christmas goods and  
malls were on board for these places,  
she pushed after great trouble, got  
there at daylight Wednesday, but had  
to anchor at White Point, there be-  
ing too much sea running to enter  
either place. He sent two men each  
way to get the mails, and they had  
four miles to walk to do so. The ship  
arrived at Newtown at 2:35 p.m. Wed-  
nesday, and after taking in intermedi-  
ate ports arrived at Bonavista at 1:45  
a.m. yesterday. A gale of southerly  
wind and snow prevented the ship  
calling at Bay de Verde yesterday. Her  
saloon passengers were Mr. Welton  
Mr. McMan, B. Templeman, Mr. Gar-  
diner and 12 steerage. She had 70  
passengers on the round trip.

## Window Blazes Up.

At 6:30 p.m. yesterday while Mr.  
Joseph Rodgers, assistant in the dry  
goods store of Mr. Thomas, Water St.,  
West, was about to light the gas in  
the window, he came near setting the  
premises on fire. The window is de-  
corated for Christmas and the lighted  
match which he used accidentally  
touched some of the draperies and the  
whole were instantly ablaze. The  
silks and fancy goods burned quickly  
and Mr. Thomas and his son with  
Rodgers worked hard to quench the  
flames. They pulled down all the  
contents of the window and throwing  
the burning goods on the floor stamp-  
ed the fire out. About \$50 worth of  
stock was destroyed, and in trying to  
quench the blaze Mr. Thomas had his  
hands burned. He carries no insur-  
ance on his stock.

## Store for Scholars.

We learn by the Fogota that Mr. J.  
Parsons has given his fish store, at  
Noggin Cove, for the use of the pupils  
whose school was destroyed by fire a  
few weeks ago. The store has been  
comfortably fitted up for the children,  
and in the spring a new one will be  
erected. Miss Parsons is still teach-  
ing there. The fire is now known to  
be of incendiary origin, but the per-  
son suspected is at the point of death.

## Virtues of Apple Sauce

Germ-Killing Powers of Cider.  
The scientific reason for serving  
apple sauce with roast goose, the  
benefits of strawberries and lemon  
for the gouty, and the antiseptic qual-  
ities of grapes and apples were some  
of the points emphasized by Mr. Dud-  
ley D.A. Wright, F.R.C.S., lecturing  
on the "Dietic and Medicinal Value  
of Fruits" before the British Homeo-  
pathic Association recently.

Instead of being bad for gout,  
strawberries and lemons, on account  
of their newly-discovered salicylic  
acid ingredients, are distinctly health-  
ful. It is only when strawberries are  
eaten with sugar, which in fermenta-  
tion forms lactic acid and butyric acids,  
that gouty symptoms are aggravated.  
Strawberries, apples, lemons and  
grapes also contain substances which

act as natural germ-killers. Pure  
apple cider, according to the lecturer,  
is the ideal drink in typhoid-infested  
districts; as the typhoid bacillus and  
its near relation, the bacillus coli, are  
readily killed by the contained ger-  
micide.

Pineapples are the ideal fruit for  
the person who cannot readily digest  
meats or who suffers from sore  
throat. The ferment bromelin found  
in pineapple juice not only digests  
meats and the curd of milk, but will  
also soften the membrane which  
forms on the back of the throat of a  
diphtheria patient, and it will cause  
its disappearance.

It is on account of the antiseptic  
action of apple juice, as well as its  
tendency to prevent fermentation in  
the stomach, that apple sauce is the  
inevitable companion of the rich and  
indigestible roast goose.

cholera epidemic. The disease is still  
claiming many victims.

Rodriguez, is suitably avenged." The  
proclamations are signed by over 200  
business men of Guadala Jara, all  
Mexicans. One paper, Elpaisa, pub-  
lishes it and calls on Mexicans to  
heed it.
