Regatta Committee Meeting Last Night.

The Regatta Committee held another enthusiastic meeting at Woods' West End Restaurant last night.

The President, Hon. John Harvey, occupied the chair, and there were present—V. P. Hiscock, Treasurer Crotty, Secretary Noonan, Messrs. F. Hamlin, W. Dugan, R. W. Jeans, A. G. Williams, J. R. Bennett, John Day, J. W. Morris, B. Wood, P. Laracy, Dr. Scully, T. J. Poran (News), R. J. Dowden (Herald), T. D. Carew (Telegram). After the minutes of the previous meeting had been read and adopted the Hon. John Harvey in a graceful little speech congratulated Secretary James L. Noonan on the attainment of his 47th birthday, spoke of his 16 years experience as Secretary of the Regatta Committee, and congratulated him on the excellent and very satisfactory manner in which he had performed the various duties of his office in that best year, but felt that his office in that lengthy period and concluding by wishing him "ad multos annos." Mr. Noonan in a brief but hearty speech thanked the President for his kindly reference to him and for his good wishes, and was heartily congratulated by the various members who cordially shook hands with him.

Capt. Eli Dewe wrote that he will be glad to act as judge on Regatta Day as requested by the committee. Mr. H. Ford wrote asking for a place on the programme for the St. Mary's Young Men's Association in the Society race. Request was acceded to. The position of the Truckmen and Factories races were reversed on the programme.

The collectors reported at the meeting that they were much behind what they had collected to a similar date last year, but felt that as Regatta Day is growing in popularity with our people they will be the recipients of as much if not more than that of 1910 so that the Coronation Regatta may be recalled in future years as one of the most enjoyable in the annals of our great aquatic derby.

The Grand Falls Boys Brigade asked for a position in the Inter-Brigade Race and were given it with pleasure. Our boys must necessarily look to their laurels as the impression is that the Pulp City will enter a sturdy crew of oarsmen for that race.

Mr. Walter Irwin will drive the judges, as usual, on Regatta Day. Mr. R. Dowden in a neat little speech proposed that Mrs. A. W. Harvey, the venerable and respected mother of the President of the Committee, be requested to present the cups and medals to the fortunate winners in the different events. Mr. Jas. P. Crotty seconded this and it was supported by Mr. W. W. Jeans and others and was unanimously carried amidst the acclamations of all present.

On the suggestion of Mr. P. Laracy it was determined that in the event of a member of one of the City Brigades winning first in the open and Brigade Swimming Races which occur simultaneously be the only awarded one prize and that the next swimmer to arrive in and not a member of a Brigade be given the prize for the open Swimming contest.

Increase in Beer Sales

New York, July 6.—No less than 62,000,000 barrels of beer were sold in the United States during the 12 months ending June 30 last, or an increase over the previous 12 months of 6.21 per cent, according to the annual report of the beer and whiskey sales made public here to-day by the United States Brewers' Association. Notwithstanding the increase, which the report contends indicates that the country is prosperous, the spread of prohibition has affected the trade considerably, it is declared.

"No doubt a good deal of bottled beer is going into the dry territory," the report reads, "but it is not enough to offset the loss of the draft beer and stout trade. The beer business is mainly a city business, and in good times a steady increase may be counted upon."

The whiskey bill of the United States for the year, according to the report, is \$146,573,000, an increase of nearly \$8,000,000, or 5.66 per cent over the preceding 12 months.

City Council.

Present: a full Board at last evening's meeting at 3.30.

It was decided after a discussion about the distribution of the Council's patronage to lay down new rules in October next that must be adhered to and will ensure a more equitable distribution of the money paid to mechanics and others.

Secretary J. Harris, of the Board of Works, sent a letter saying that as it is contemplated by the Government to enlarge the Post Office in the near future that land adjoining cannot be given for a cab stand.

Inspector General Sullivan sent a communication saying that he will have the question of the damage done to the lights at St. Michael's Church investigated. Had the case been reported to him earlier he would have probably rounded up the culprits. He asked that an old house near Browning's, Water St. West, be removed or improved. He says that he cannot possibly allow two policemen for Bannerman Park and requests that all damage be reported as soon as discovered.

The South Side Road near Mr. E. Harvey's residence will be improved. The West End Committee will make enquiry into Mr. Cousen's representation about a lavatory at the South Side.

The petition of P. F. Collins and Mrs. Hayse to have water pipes extended to Portugal Cove Road was referred to the Engineer.

Architect Jonas Barter reported progress on the City Hall.

The petition of Jas. Taylor, of Le-Merchant Road, to get a job as watchman was referred to Engineer.

The East End Committee will inquire into petition for drain sent in by the residents of Gill Place, off Pilot's Hill.

A note was received from Mr. A. A. Parsons, Secretary Coronation Committee, thanking the Council for the lights given free and other assistance at the recent Children's Concert.

The Road Committee will investigate H. Ford's complaint about the road between Long Bridge and Moore's premises.

The Secretary will attend to H. Meade's claim for land taken on Hamilton Avenue for street widening.

The complaint of T. Grant on O'Reilly's fence was referred to the Solicitor.

J. Hilliard was refused permission to build on the extension of McKay Street.

Mrs. T. Murphy was given leave to erect porch on Brazil's Square.

F. Smallwood was given permission to use a portion of the sidewalk for scaffolds, etc., while building is being erected corner Duckworth Street and Mulcardo's Lane.

J. Hudson is allowed to put steps to house on Mullock Street.

F. J. Morris, Solicitor, reported that the Council is liable for damage caused by water to Mr. Higgins' house. He also reported on removal of stable at Atlantic Avenue.

The residents of Holloway St., Gill Place and Pilot's Hill will be asked to make water connection.

Dr. Brehm reported that Mr. Cash, an employee of the Council, is recovering from his illness.

The Sanitary Inspector, on the report of the Health Officer, will have the heap of rubbish near Lilly's house, opposite Mount Carmel Cemetery removed.

A light will be placed in the public lavatory at Job's Cove.

The meal hours of the Park policeman will be changed in order to give him an opportunity to do his duties more effectively.

The Solicitor will be asked to codify the rules of the Council and have its legal rights clearly defined.

After passing pay rolls the meeting closed at 7 o'clock.

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Hoosier School System

Does Not Follow Old Ideas—Children Should Not Run Loose for Three Months in the Summer, Says Rheta Childs Dorr.

To-day, in Gary, Ind., has been evolved one of the most remarkably successful educational systems in the Public schools this country has ever seen. The problem was to provide education for an industrial population containing twenty-eight different nationalities. That problem has been solved by the methods worked out by William A. Wirt, the superintendent. In an article on these Gary schools in the July Hampton's entitled "Keeping the Children in School," Rheta Childs Dorr, says:—

"The basis of Mr. Wirt's system is an intelligent acceptance of the fact that times have changed in the past generation and that the town and city home not only in Gary, but elsewhere, can no longer fulfil its original responsibilities toward children. There was a time when the moral and general training of children could be done anywhere else, because at that time, the home was an industrial centre. The children learned by doing. They formed habits which determined their whole future lives.

"The old time domestic system of cooking, sewing, preserving, manufacturing, in the farm or village home, was highly educational because it formed habits of independent thinking, initiative and industry.

"To have learned to know the right thing to do," says Mr. Wirt, "is not character, but to have formed the habit of doing the right thing is character. When the home lost the opportunity for the industrial training of its children it also lost its power for efficient moral and general character training, because these were inseparably linked with the industrial training."

"We are too prone to accept a situation, continue a system, cling to an ideal, long after it has served its purpose. Our school system, for example, is surrounded with conventionalities, the very meaning of which has been forgotten. Why do we invariably have vacations in summer? Because two generations ago, when the Public schools were established, the children's labor was needed on the farm in summer. Why do we dismiss children from school in the middle of the afternoon? They used to need that time before supper to 'do the chores.' In this day and generation, especially in cities, it is not only futile, it is criminal to allow children to run idle during three months of the year. It is to put it mildly, dangerous to turn them out to the streets from three o'clock until dark. This is Mr. Wirt's conviction, and that is why, in Gary, the children are kept in school from half-past eight until four and five.

"They live in a veritable child world, a world in which there is plenty of work to do, but the work is a pleasantly mingled with play and exercise that no one is ever bored or wearied. About three hours each day are devoted to formal work in reading, writing, arithmetic and history. About three and a half hours each day are given to manual training, natural science, music, literature and 'formal' gymnasium work. The rest of the time is given to free activities in the gymnasium, swimming pools and in the five acre playground. The manual training shops and the school laboratories are open during these periods, and many of the older pupils choose to work in them alone.

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A Scamp Arrested.

Yesterday as Mrs. Power, of Barter's Hill, was proceeding up Adelaide Street on her way home she was accosted by a man who used the most brutal and insulting remarks that could assail the ears of man or woman. Mrs. Power though greatly frightened had presence of mind enough to call Const. Tolin who was not far away, and who gave chase to the fellow when he ran, and capturing him whisked him away to the lock-up. He proved to be a foreign seaman who came out in the Solway, and no doubt he will receive his deserts.
