### First Ore Boat.

The first ore boat for the season arrived at Bell Island Tuesday last and sailed Wednesday for Sydney. This was the new Black Diamond ship Glace Bay, and she took 11,000 tons of ore from the B. I. & S. Co. She is a fine boat, not long off the stocks and was built on the Clyde for the Dominion Iron & Steel Co. This is the first year that the B. I. & S. Co. have sent away the first ore cargo for the season. The regular ore boats like the Themis, Stratus and others will be at work in May. This is the earliest time on record that an ore cargo has been despatched from the Island.

At the Synod meeting of the Church of England, held Monday night, Rev. Canon Smyth, as Bishop's Commissioner, presided and was warmly congratulated by all present on his recovery from his recent severe illness. The Rev. gentleman is now able to be about again, a fact which will be learned with pleasure by all classes in the city.

### Cathedral Parish Meeting.

The annual Easter meeting of the Church of England Cathedral Parish took place in the Synod Building last night. The Cathedral Rector, Rev. Canon White, presided over a large attendance. The various reports submitted were satisfactory. The election of officers for the ensuing year took place and the different wardens appointed. At the close customary votes of thanks were passed followed by Benediction given by Canon White, after which the meeting adjourned.

### Sealing Turnouts.

The s.s. Viking finished discharging last night. She turned out as follows: 21,212 young hares, 14 old hares, 1 old wood, total, 21,226 seals. Gross weight, 475 tons, 12 lbs.; nett, 400 tons, 14 cwt., 1 qr., 9 lbs. Gross value, \$41,379.42; less damaged skins, \$198.00. Nett, \$41,181.42. Her crew of 139 men shared \$72.25.  
 The s.s. Newfoundland finished landing last evening. Her turnout was 7,684 young hares, 583 young hoods, 1,650 bedlamers, 135 old hares, 24 old hoods; total, 12,076 seals. The gross value was \$22,340.52; less damaged skins, \$240.00. Nett, \$22,100.52. Gross weight, 270 tons, 12 cwt., 3 qrs., 25 lbs. Nett, 258 tons, 7 cwt., 8 lbs. Her crew of 146 men shared \$50.11.

The S. S. Durango sailed from Liverpool this morning with 1,000 tons of cargo for this port.

### Human Fossils.

The study of human fossils first became established as a recognized science in 1844-46. Darwin meanwhile had assumed the existence at a certain period in recent geological times of an animal type of man or "missing link" between humanity and the big apes. In 1865 Haeckel made a guess sketch of the creature in question, whose discovery he declared would soon take place. Twenty-eight years later Dr. Dubois unearthed in Java bones which corresponded to the assumptions of Haeckel.

In 1856 there was found in Germany the fossil skeleton known as the "Man of Neanderthal." This was a man five feet two inches in height, of robust build and well developed muscles, and possessed of great animal vitality but a limited intelligence, since the skull, although large, contained a relatively small brain. Of later date and more evolved was the "Man of Cromagnon," discovered among other skeletons in 1868. In him also the brain development was slight. Both these fossils, one dating from the middle of the Quaternary age and the other from the end of the same period, are inferior not only to the white man of to-day, but to contemporary humanity in general.

There remains the third example of the third type of prehistoric man, the "Man of Grimaldi," so christened in honor of the reigning family of Monaco. He is also called after the Red Rocks grottoes that give directly on the sea near Mentone. These are nine in number and of the Tertiary period. To determine the age of the skeletons it was necessary first to ascertain that of the grottoes, to which tradition ascribed various dates. Superficially examined in 1872, these caves were subjected from 1895 to 1902 to a methodical search, which resulted in the discovery of some fossil skeletons. From 1895 to 1905 four new specimens were brought to light, which, with those already found, made a total of sixteen. Of these, which all belong to the earlier half of the Quaternary period, fourteen resemble the "Man of Cromagnon." The other two, a young man and an old woman, call for a new definition.

### The Riddle of The Sphinx.

Who would have imagined at this late day, after being visited by thousands of travellers, back over hundreds of years, that the great mystery of Egypt, the Sphinx, would possibly clear away the cobwebs and make its past an open book?

Press despatches to London papers inform us, however, that such is the case. A correspondent writing the "Westminster Gazette" from Egypt says that "Prof. Reigner has succeeded in removing the sand of 60 centuries from the interior of the head, and has gained entrance through the neck to a temple that runs the whole length of the gigantic body, measuring 120 feet in length. In this temple is a pyramid which forms the tomb of Menes, the first king of Egypt, and is supposed to contain his mummified body. Sloping passages from the temple lead to other chambers as yet unexplored, and it is thought, to a subterranean city."

Here, perchance, lies the solution of the riddle of the Sphinx.

### J. P. Morgan's Collection.

An English journal, referring to Mr. J. Pierpont Morgan's collection, says that he owns the finest piano ever made, dating from 1706, and exhibited at the St. Louis Exposition; a rock crystal, once the property of Lord Anglessey, bought for four thousand guineas; the Raphael Madonna of St. Anthony of Padua, for which he paid a hundred thousand pounds; ten panels painted by Fragonard for Madame Dubarry, valued at a still higher figure; the manuscript of Book I. of "Paradise Lost"; a number of Caxtons, and many other literary, artistic and historical curiosities. There is a story told of how he bought Gainsborough's famous "Duchess." No one knew that he was even bidding for it. Eventually, he was approached, but denied having purchased it. Then, on the other side of the water, one of the journalists of his own land took him in hand. "Now, Mr. Morgan, have you bought that picture?" he demanded. "Yes, I have," was the reply. "Then, sir, what did you mean by saying in London that you hadn't?" was the cool query. "Because," replied the financier, "I had not. The sale was subject to the receipt of a guarantee of authenticity. That arrived half an hour ago. Good-morning!" Londoners are overjoyed to find that Mr. Morgan which they may be apt to forget. We have to thank him for the installation of electric lighting at Sir Paul's Cathedral. The first estimate of the work was four thousand pounds but although "extras" ran it up to nine thousand, he paid without a murmur.
