Cabinet Backs Wilson.

WASHINGTON, To-Day.
President Wilson's Cabinet stands firmly behind him in his efforts to force the retirement of Huerta as a necessary step to the pacification of Mexico. For more than two hours yesterday the Cabinet discussed every phase of the Mexican situation, and the consensus of opinion was that the States Government should not take a single backward step in its announced programme looking to the restoration of constitutional government. Though the secretaries were reticent afterwards about expressing their views, it became known that they all favoured steps which would convince Huerta that the States was in earnest in its demands that he eliminate himself from the situation. On the question of raising the embargo on arms, the Cabinet members expressed various opinions. Some of them recognize in this method a practical and perhaps an early solution of the difficulty, but there was no final decision on the point. There was a hope on the part of both the President and Secretary Bryan that a measure so radical as permitting the exportations of arms

may not be required to solve the problem. Influences are at work which in the opinion of many officials may force an early collapse of the Huerta regime. There is a closer understanding for instance and more frequent communication between the State Department here and Foreign Governments generally, than has been in evidence at any time since the Mexican problem became so widely international, not only through American Embassies and legations abroad, but through the diplomatic Corps in Washington. Secretary Bryan is giving such detailed information of American policy as to leave no doubt of what the States would like to see accomplished. So far as is known there have been no direct requests for foreign support, but strong indications that the States would like foreign nations to refrain completely from interference in the affairs of Huerta. The Government are expected to produce tangible results. It is reported that Sir Edward Grey, Private-Secretary to British Foreign Minister, Sir Edward Grey, has obtained Secretary Bryan's views on the situation and had them transmitted in a long report of the situation to London.
