Playing With Loaded Dice



It is not at all surprising that President Wilson has taken advantage of President Wilson's Note on the armistice of merchantmen while engaged in mercantile work. President Wilson asked the belligerents to accept the principle that such merchantmen should not carry any arms to protect themselves and their passengers against submarine attacks. It was clearly a one-sided arrangement because Germany and her allies have not adopted the policy of murdering their crews and passengers by torpedoes from submarines. The object of arming an Entente merchantman is not to attack submarine or any other vessel, but solely to ward off the danger of the crews and passengers by the German sea wolves. The sole effect of an adherence to Wilson's proposal by the Entente would be to leave them more easy victims to the depredations of these sea wolves. Germany has given no undertaking that she will not murder such passengers, because a submarine has no means of sinking a passenger ship and saving those aboard, when these are numerous, as on passenger liners. Moreover, if Germany gave such an undertaking it would be a worthless scrap of paper, and as for President Wilson's efforts to bring such murderers to book, they are worthless. In the first place if no Americans are murdered, he ignores the murder absolutely. There are Americans aboard, he writes a Note. It follows therefore that President Wilson asks Britain and her allies to forego the placing of a gun on a liner to protect those aboard from being murdered by German submarines, while it is understood that he shall do nothing if the hundreds of passengers murdered are only British, French, Italian or Russians, and that if by any chance an American is aboard he may add a few more letters to his collection, with perhaps a little bit of bluster. It is no wonder that Germany should have played up to him against Britain and her allies by the threat to treat armed merchantmen as warships. This really adds nothing to the danger as she usually claims that the ship sunk is armed, although it is not armed. The Lusitania tragedy is a case in point. The surprising feature is that President Wilson should have lent himself to play the German game with loaded dice.
