THE ESSENCE OF COAKERISM IS DISORDER.

SALVAGE, Oct. 18.
 Government candidates held record meeting at Salvage and Bishop's Hr. on Thursday night. Great enthusiasm prevailed, and there was little interruption. They held a largely attended meeting at Salvage Bay last night. Winsor and Forbes were quietly listened to, but Morine was interrupted at the outset, and Union partisans who were present from outlying places, noisily rushed from the hall. Morine continued and completed a slashing speech, while the fellows who had gone outside shouted and pounded upon the building and otherwise ineffectually tried to break up the meeting. It was closed with the National Anthem and cheers for the candidates. The interruption and other misconduct were clearly organized and probably expressly inspired by the Opposition candidates who were here recently. The ringleaders were Coakerites, who disturbed the House of Assembly last spring when Morine was flying Coaker. The respectable people of Salvage Bay are ashamed of the disorder, but have no reason to be so, as the rowdies were outsiders. After the meeting was over they threw rocks and sods, and struck one man heavily, but none of the candidates were injured. The very essence of Coakerism is disorder, and as one speaker said, God pity the country if it gets control.

That Ferryland Meeting.

Editor Evening Telegram.
 Dear Sir:—English and Hartery held a meeting here recently, which proved a miserable failure. Hartery was first to speak telling us he had done more good for the District the past two years than any member ever did. Well, we let him off with that, nobody taking him serious; he next told us that there should never have been a Nfld. regiment, and then to enforce Conscription, that was worst of all. He said there was no need of it (he was here interrupted by one of our returned soldiers, who said: "We did not need Conscription here, we volunteered for service on land and sea, over thirty of us, we would not have it hung in our faces that we shirked our duty while others were fighting. If every settlement in the Island did like Ferryland, according to its population, there certainly would not be any need of Conscription." Mr. Hartery was then told to give us something else as that kind of stuff would not be listened to here. He sat down shortly after appearing very much crestfallen. Mr. English spoke next, and he capped the climax. He deplored the neglected condition of our District, and told us that the poverty and misery existing on our shore could only compare to some of the Esquimaux settlements he had seen in the farthest North. He was interrupted by a dozen voices thanking him for the nice compliment to the Southern Shore and assured him they would not forget it soon. A great number of them left the hall, fearing if they stayed they would have to use violence if English continued his insulting remarks. We feel sure the votes of Ferryland District will teach English and Hartery a lesson on the 3rd of November by rolling up the largest vote ever recorded here for Cashin and Moore.

THE TRANSCONTINENTAL FLIGHT ACCOMPLISHED.

MINESOLA, Oct. 18.
 Lieut. Maynard, who has the victory in the air race across the continent and return, landed here at 1.50 p.m. Lieut. Maynard fled the 142 miles of the last stage of his great flight from ocean to ocean and return at a speed of almost two miles a minute.

FIRST PAYMENT MADE.

BERLIN, Oct. 18.
 The Cologne Gazette says it understands that Germany has paid the first instalment of the war indemnity. The newspaper says it consisted of delivery of various commodities amounting to 20,000,000,000 marks.

WANT SHARE IN MANAGEMENT.

LONDON, Oct. 20.
 The railway employees ask for a share in the management of the companies, and it is hoped the companies will consider this proposal, said J. H. Thomas, Secretary of the National Union of Railwaymen, in a speech at Derby, last night. He expressed the belief that railway employees could contribute to the management by reason of their experience and ability, and that in this capacity their services would be valuable to both railroads and country.

OFF FOR PORT SAID.

MARSEILLES, Oct. 20.
 Field Marshal Allenby, British High Commissioner for Egypt and the Sudan, embarked on a British ship to-day for Port Said.

GREAT DEMONSTRATION.

PARIS, Oct. 19.
 The Place de l'Hotel de Ville, where Marshals Joffre, Foch and Petain received the Swords of Honor during the victory celebration, and where many other ceremonies occurred during the war, to-day was the scene of the greatest demonstration of all, when President Poincare pinned the Croix de Guerre on a cushion bearing the arms of the City of Paris.

LONG SESSION OF PARLIAMENT ENDED.

PARIS, Oct. 19.
 The curtain was rung down to-night on a session of Parliament which sat uninterruptedly through the greatest crisis of French history. Premier Clemenceau was the leading actor in the drama. Little ceremony marked the conclusion of business. Paul Deschamps, President of the Chamber of Deputies, who was deeply moved, eulogized the war session of Parliament and paid homage to the heroic soldiers of France and the glorious dead; he reviewed the task accomplished by Parliament and expressed the hope that the new Chamber would work to raise France from the ruins of war. Before the applause had subsided M. Clemenceau rose, and in a loud, clear voice read a decree closing the session.

WITHDRAWAL OF TERRITORIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS.

LONDON, Oct. 20.
 Members of the Territorial Government in the northern territory of Australia have yielded to threats of extremists there and left Port Darwin on Saturday. Their departure followed the demand by extremists for institution of representative government and right to vote, and the request that Territorial Government officials leave by first steamer in order to avoid a revolution.

Storms That Cost Millions.

ONE SANK TWO BIG FLEETS AND KILLED 20,000 PEOPLE.

Damage to the extent of five millions sterling has been done by the hurricane which has just been raging at Valparaiso.

That such a storm should have taken place at such a time of year is a most amazing occurrence. Valparaiso being in the southern hemisphere, July there is the mid-winter month. All the great storms previously recorded in that part of the world have occurred between November and March.

The worst hurricane of which any record exists was that of October 10th, 1780, which started in the Barbadoes. An English fleet anchored off St. Lucia simply disappeared; nearly every building on the island was blown down, and six thousand people buried.

Travelling towards Martinique, the storm overtook a French fleet of forty ships. Not one out of their crews escaped. In all 4,000 men were drowned. In Martinique itself 9,000 people perished. At Port Royal fourteen hundred houses were flattened to the ground. To give some idea of the appalling

force of that storm and of what air in motion can do, at St. Lucia on that day not only were whole buildings torn up from their foundations, but a large cannon was hurled to a distance of more than thirty yards.

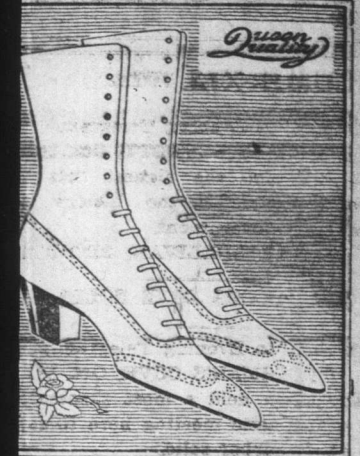
