N. F. Poultry Ass'n Annual Meeting.

The Newfoundland Poultry Association held its regular annual meeting in the Board of Trade rooms last night, H. W. LeMessurier, Esq., C.M.G., President, was in the chair. Secretary Calver and Treasurer W. R. Butler submitted reports of the last annual show, which showed that 400 birds were exhibited. It is announced that at the next show many more will enter birds for exhibition and amongst them will be His Excellency the Governor, the Minister of Agriculture & Mines, the Hon. Dr. Alex. Campbell, Mr. John O'Driscoll, Captain E.H. Daws, Judge Reid, The Dominion Fire Brigade Club, Bell Island. The annual dinner will be held some time in January and a committee was appointed to take charge of the arrangements.

The local judging competition at the show this month was announced at the meeting. A prize was offered by Vice-President Williams to the member who judged the most number of winning birds correctly in the show, the entries being filed with Secretary Calver before the Canadian judge made his awards. 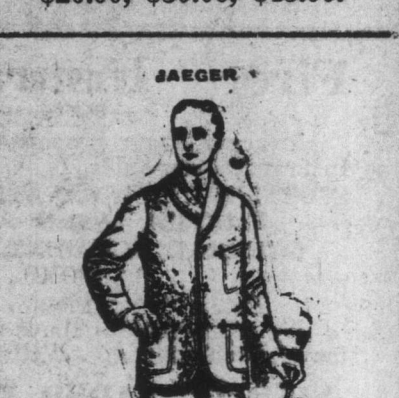

A Reasonable Argument

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—Kindly allow me space in your highly esteemed paper for a few words concerning our returned soldiers. I have been refused help by the Re-establishment Committee, like many others, and I ask you are we getting a square deal? I think such treatment is an insult to the majority of the returned men. Of course we are not asking to be pampered or pitied in any way as some people think. The reason why so many of our boys are unemployed and leaving the country to-day, is because nobody seems to want the services of the returned soldier here in Newfoundland. I feel pretty safe in saying that the majority of the returned soldiers have to take what employment they can get, and start over again, much worse off than when they left to go overseas. Of course, some had their positions reserved for them. Regarding the extra gratuity, I should like to say that if a man who served three or four years with the colors, were to get an extra bonus, he would simply be on a level, as regards wages, with the man who stayed behind in Newfoundland. Am I not right in saying that Newfoundland is very ungrateful to her boys who gave up all for the cause of freedom?

In conclusion, I might say that it is quite possible for our Government to spend money in a great deal more judiciously than in giving larger gratuities to our returned soldiers. Let me suggest that they cut some of the Government officials salaries then.
