Old Feildian Club Re-organized.

Tait, Dr. A. C. Tait, R. James, E. S. Pineson and C. E. A. Jeffrey. The first business to come before the meeting was the election of officers for the coming hockey season. Mr. C. E. A. Jeffrey was moved to the chair, and Mr. H. C. Hayward was appointed secretary of the meeting. The following officers were elected:

Several matters in connection with hockey were then discussed. A vote of thanks was passed unanimously to Mr. M. G. Mr. Jeffrey vacated the chair and Dr. Blackall was unanimously appointed chairman. It was proposed by Mr. R. R. Wood, and seconded by M. G. Winter that the Old Feildian Club be reformed. This motion was carried without a dissenting voice. A general discussion then followed re matters in connection with the Club and it was finally moved that a committee of six be appointed to go into the matter fully and report to a general meeting to be held later. The committee appointed consisted of the following: Messrs. R. H. Tait (convenor), R. R. Wood, C. E. A. Jeffrey, E. S. Pineson, G. Hunt, R. James. A vote of thanks to Dr. Blackall for the able manner in which he had filled the chair, was then passed and the meeting closed with the usual formalities, supplemented with cheers for the Old Feildian Club and the Chairman.

Burglars at Work.

Store Window Broken—Goods Stolen.

A large pane of glass in the eastern window of the store of Mr. J. Deshowitz, at the junction of Adelaide and Water Streets, was broken at an early hour this morning, and a considerable quantity of goods stolen. The theft was supposed to have taken place between the hours of 1.30 and 2 a.m. as at the former time the night police were standing near the place and everything was intact, but upon returning on their rounds at 2 a.m. the burglary had been committed. A couple of young men seen in the vicinity about midnight are believed to be the guilty parties. Mr. Deshowitz was acquainted of the robbery soon after the occurrence and had the damaged window secured.

"Moslem Millions."

Last night in Canon Wood Hall, the Rev. Canon Smart, Rector of Heart's Content, gave an illustrated lecture under the auspices of the Women's Home Missionary Society. There was a large audience present and he took as his subject "Moslem Millions." The Rev. Lecturer was fully conversant with his subject, and in a very masterly manner told his hearers of the gradual growth of Mohammedism in the Eastern world. He took his audience through Mecca, Syria, Jerusalem, Egypt, Tripoli, Tunis, Algeria, Tangiers and Morocco, across the Straits of Gibraltar named after Tarik the leader of the Moslem hosts who was finally brought to a standstill at the battle of Tours in the year 732 and finally expelled from Europe by Ferdinand and Isabella. The lecturer also showed the picture of Granada with Caliph's palace of the Alhambra. Going eastward he traced the history of Mohammedism in Persia, India and China, and showed some splendid views of missionary work in Africa and the East, of special notice being the great educational institution known as the Robert College at Constantinople, and the Church Missionary College at Beirut. He also very graphically described the efforts to educate the women of these countries and showed views of a graduation class of Moslem girls. He also explained the various translations of the Bible amongst the Moslems and of the evangelistic and medical work that was being accomplished in the land of the Mohammed. A word of praise was given the three modern apostles, Hon. Ion Keith-Falconer, Henry Martin and Bishop Valpy French whose work in India and Arabia gave such splendid results. During the lecture Mrs. Cocker gave a pleasing rendition of the "Holy City" which was illustrated by twelve splendid slides and later in the evening Mrs. Cocker was again called upon to give a second rendition of this beautiful and appropriate song. Mr. L. Colley also recited "A Moslem Woman at Prayer" which was also illustrated, whilst Miss Miss Brown charmed the audience by reciting a little missionary poem entitled "The Little Brown Box." At the close a vote of thanks proposed by Mr. L. Colley and seconded by Mr. A. Carnell, was heartily accorded the Rev. Lecturer. The Chairman, Rev. G. A. Moulton, also thanked Canon Smart for his splendid and instructive lecture, after which the singing of the National Anthem brought a most enjoyable evening to a close.

PATRICK MOLLOY.

Another link in the "Old Guard" of the seventies has been severed by the death of Mr. Patrick Molloy, who died rather suddenly at his home, St. Shott's, on the evening of December 1st, fortified by the rites of Holy Church. Deceased had attained his sixty-seventh year and all through life was blessed with a strong physique. Latterly he began to grow infirm and feeble and when three weeks ago he became ill it was little thought by his now stricken wife and family that most dear was to be taken from their midst. But one who knows best had already marked him for his own, and on the above mentioned date, perfectly resigned to the Holy will of God, his pure soul passed to its eternal home. During his brief illness he was tenderly nursed by his loving and devoted wife and family, who were present to soothe and console him by their prayerful aspirations in his dying moments. Mr. Molloy was of a happy, kind and humorous disposition and his presence would cause merriment, good feeling and a genial ray of sunshine in any company. When he culminated and peacefully passed away, on Wednesday, not a few were touched with grief on hearing of his sad demise. Interment took place in the family plot of the village cemetery, surrounded by sorrowing and sympathizing relatives and friends. Left to mourn their sad loss are a wife, two sons, two daughters and one sister, Sr. Agatha of the Presentation Convent, Trepassey, to all of whom we tender our sincerest sympathy.

Terminal Conditions at North Sydney.

During our visit to the Sydneys last week we were surprised to notice the wretched conditions prevailing at the terminal at North Sydney. From the steamer to the street (Commercial) a hundred yards or more, one has to wade through mud and water, with several ruts on the way, and at night the vicinity is poorly lighted. In view of the thousands of people who travel by that route yearly and the millions of dollars worth of freight traffic handled, we are of the opinion that the Canadian Railway authorities should have long ago provided better accommodation. At the terminal sheds there is little or no accommodation for the travelling public. When we were there the corridor was practically blocked with baggage and it was only with difficulty that people about to embark by the Kyle could reach the ticket office. We also visited the Newfoundland post office where we found similar congested conditions. In that little shack over a hundred bags of mail are received daily, and assorted into two hundred and eighty divisions. All mail matter to and from Newfoundland by the cross-country route is handled and assorted by Mr. Shano and his little staff of assistants. Millions of dollars in currency pass through this office, and yet there is little protection provided. What is required is a building four times the size of the present one, constructed of brick, concrete or other unburnable material and well lighted and heated. And provision should be made where travellers to Newfoundland could obtain accurate information about the country, its resources, sports, means of travel, etc.

Since the foregoing was written we have read the statement of the Railway Commission and note that the Canadian Government at last proposes erecting a new terminal at North Sydney at a cost of \$400,000, and that the Newfoundland Post Office will be included in the building. We trust that some attention will be given also to the approach, and would suggest that from the sidewalk, Commercial Street, to the terminal be paved—Western Star.

Complaint is being made of the general public purchasing foreign manufactured goods, while our industrial productions are allowed to remain to rot in the warehouses. Now where does the fault lay? What are those manufacturing concerns doing to remedy matters? It is up to them to impress the public of the merits of their products. Let them standardize their goods and then take advantage of means obtainable to keep their wares before the purchasing public. The newspaper has been long recognized as the best and most profitable means of advertising. There are in St. John's a number of daily and weekly newspapers and the East and West Coasts are covered by their own local weeklies. Here is a means by which the manufacturer can talk to the people throughout the country and keep his goods before them continually. Occasional advertising is like an occasional shower—it thunders, and there is lightning and a few drops of rain; and after it's all over, everybody asks, "what was it all about anyway?" The steady rain makes the fields green and the crops to grow and fills the streams; so does advertising sell the manufacturer's products and keep the wheels of industry going.
