London, Aug. 14.—(3.50 a. m.)— The British Consulate at Canton, says The Daily Telegraph's correspondent there, has received the following message, Aug. 6, from Sir Claude Macdonald, British Minister

Our situation here is desperate In 10 days our food supply will be at an end. Unless we are relieved at an end. Unless we are relieved a general massacre is probable.

"The Chinese offer to escort us to Tien Tsin, but, remembering Cawnpore, we refused the offer. There are over 200 European women and children in this legation."

Getting Close to Pekin. The Shanghai correspondent of The cally Express, wiring yesterday, Daily

Daily Express, wiring yesterday, says:

"The allies at noon yesterday were within 20 miles of Pekin."

As Gen. Chaffee's report, which is the only authentic news received here regarding the advance, locates the international forces about 40 miles from Pekin on Friday, it seems probable that this Shanghai report is optimistic. It is scarcely likely that the allies could advance 20 miles in as many hours.
