BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

The Queen's Speech Contains No Reference to Newfoundland.

Lord Salisbury Seriously Ill-The Prince's Death Creates Sympathy for the Royal Family.

London, Feb. 9.—At the opening of Parliament the interest of the aristocrats, especially the largest portion of this class, was centered in the House of Lords, where the Earl of Dudley, noted for his skill as a gentleman rider, was selected to make his maiden parliamentary effort by moving the address in reply to the Queen's speech.

London, Feb. 8.—A large number of ladies were present in the House of Lords. All were attired in mourning out of respect to the late Duke of Clarence and Avondale. The chief interest was centered in the to the late Duke of Clarence and Avondale. The chief interest was centered in the House of Commons, where the popular members, as they entered and took their seats, were welcemed with hearty cheers. John Henry Maden, the Gladstonian who was elected to succeed Lord Hartington (Liberal-Unionist) as member for the Rossendale division of Lancashire, was cheered by the Opposition when he entered. George Lambert (Gladstonian), who in the South Molton division of Devonshire turned a Liberal-Unionist majority of 1,600 into a minor of 1,200, came into the House for the first time as a member for that constituency. He received an enthusiastic welcome from the Opposition benches.

of State for the Colonies, expressed his
surprise that the Queen's speech made no
reference to the dispute between Great
Britain and France in regard to the
claims of the latter country in

The Earl said he concurred in the tones of the speech in its references to the loss sustained by her Majesty and the nation in the death of the Duke of Clarence and Avondale.

Regarding the absence of any reference to Newfoundland in the Queen's speech Lord Salisbury said that the present settlement of the question was not due to the action of the Government, but to the people of Newfoundland themselves.

BURNED TO DEATH. Fatal Fire in Mattawa Village-Two

Livos Lost.

Mattawa, Ont., Feb. 9.— Fire broke out this morning in a frame building on Main street occupied by Mr. Rothschild. It originated in the lower floor, which was used as a tailor shop and gents' furnishing store. The fire spread rapidly. Mrs. M. Rothschild, a girl aged 6 and a Laby about 1 year old, who were in the upper flat, perished in the flames. N. Gauvreau's large storehouse and ginger ale factory were destroyed. The whole portion of the village east and south of where the fire originated as far as O'Farrell's corner must have been swept out of existence but for the exertions of the fire brigade and spectators. Loss is about \$12,000; partly insured.

A report was presented, as below, from the Committee on Agriculture:
Your committee begs leave to report that while they do not enjoy as high a degree of prosperity as they have had in past years, they have, however, abundant reason for gratitude for the bountiful harvest of last year, which, with the exception of a partial failure in some sections, has been very favorable on the whole, supplying abundance for man and beast, through the length and breadth of the land. Comparing our condition with that of people in other lands, the lines have fallen to us in pleasant places. At the same time there is plenty of room for improvement in many departments. The practice of constant cropping heretofore prevailing, to use a common phrase, has been played out, and the farmer under changed conditions must necessarily adapt himself to altered circumstances. If one department of farming is overdone to the neglect of another, he must govern himself accordingly. No general rule would suit all parts of the country alike. That which would be applicable to another part, so that no arbitrary rule can be laid down that would do justice to all the rest. The time was when the raising of wheat was the most profitable product of the farm. After that failed, cattle and horses took the place of wheat. Now we find that they in their turn have become a partial drug. Dairying is now recommended by many as the surest and most profitable industry for the farmers of Ontario. Your committee would, therefore, recommend a mixed system of farmers to farmers to prosecute that industry which is best fitted for their own part of the country.

Fatal Accident at Forgus - A Young

Fergus, Feb. 9.—A sad coasting accident occured here this evening to a farmer,

not known what injuries Mr. Hall sustained. ANARCHISTS EXECUTED IN SPAIN Active Steps Being Taken by the Clergy

to Prevent the Spread of Anarchism. MADRID, Feb. 10.—The four leaders MADRID, Feb. 10.—The four leaders of the anarchists who attacked the town of Xeres were executed to-day. The platform upon which the garrotes were fixed was in the plaza directly in front of the jail. The four men passed their last night on earth in their cells, where two of them who professed to be Christians received religious consolation from the priests in attendance. Early this morning the final mass was said, and shortly afterwards the prisoners were escorted by a number of guards and priests to the plaza. Here the executioners fixed the collars about their necks, and in an exceedingly short time they paid the penalty of their crimes with their lives.
