LIBERALISM STILL IN THE ASCENDANT.

The Liberal victory at West Hartlepool yesterday was the most signal of all the triumphs achieved by Gladstone and his followers since the general election of 1895, when the people, misapprehending the intentions of the Grand Old Man and led astray by the specious promises of Salisbury, turned the Liberal leader out of office.

West Hartlepool is one of the leading industrial centers in the county of Durham. It is a representative English borough. To influence the democratic element of the community as far as was possible, the Conservative chose for their candidate Sir William Grey, a representative citizen, a very popular man in the town, a great employer of labor, and to his honor be it said, a public benefactor. Mr. Furness, the Liberal candidate, moves in a less pretentious sphere, nevertheless he is a man of character, of sterling honesty—a Liberal of the Liberals. He entered on his contest with an anti-Gladstonian majority of over 900 against him, and he has come out with a majority of 300 at his back. The result is a rebuke to the timid, a splendid proof of the triumph of principle over recognized personal popularity, and a striking testimony that a great cause cannot be weakened, though it may be temporarily embarrassed, by the inconsistency of any one man. The English people cannot be led to believe that reforms in the management of Ireland and in the other portions of the kingdom should be delayed because Parnell forgot what he owed to his country and to the statesmen who are striving to do her justice.

The victory at West Hartlepool, in the face of odds so great, cannot be exaggerated. Yet it is but one of a long series—extending from the last election to the present time in almost unbroken procession. Last year, only one seat was won by the Conservatives—that of Ayr, where a Liberal majority of 130. The Conservatives kept two seats by increased majorities—Windsor by 550 in place of 405, and Basildon by 728 in place of 205; and they reduced the Liberal majority in Mid-Durham—where a few hundreds make no appreciable difference—from 2,504 to 2,004. Such is the full chronicle of Tory disastat success at the bye-elections. On the Liberal side there is a brighter record. The Liberals last year won four seats—North St. Pancras, by 108 in place of a Tory majority of 301; the Carnarvon Boroughs, by 18 in place of a Tory majority of 136; Barrow, by 132 in place of a "Unionist" majority of 1,330, and Keele, by 205 in place of a Tory majority of 292. Stoke-on-Trent was kept by the Liberals with a majority increased from 1,102 to 1,231, and East Bristol with a majority increased from 1,736 to 2,575; and the Tory majority in Partick was reduced from 801 to 219, and in Stamford from 1,101 to 282. The net result of the twelve elections last year was a gain to the Liberal party of three seats and 3,930 votes. It may be noted that in winning the seat for the Ayr Boroughs the Tories only won back what they lost in 1888, and that in Mid-Durham the miners maintained their direct representation by returning Mr. Wilson in place of the late Mr. Crawford.

One thing about the bye-elections in Great Britain is noteworthy: the contests invariably give the real verdict of the people; there no railway, public buildings, or other bribes are dangled over the heads of the electorate, to be given or withheld by the party in power according as the election results. The Ottawa system, under the present regime, is the reverse, and it is next to impossible to get the manipulators of patronage to permit a straight fight on their record and on great questions of public policy.

Eighteen months ago Messrs. Stevens & Burns, the well-known manufacturers of this city, began the manufacture of hay presses. The presses were made of first-class material, and over \$20,000 worth of business was done during the first year. As a result the industry gave employment to 25 men. There was prospect that the business would be still further developed, when the taxing system between the Government of the United States and Canada reached that stage where the McKinley Bill became a factor. Then the profitable export of hay from Ontario to the United States was practically prohibited. The effect was almost instantaneous: the demand for hay presses by the farming community ceased, the promoters of the industry withdrew from the field, and the services of the mechanics employed in the construction of the machines were no longer required. Trade restriction has ever resulted in injury to the independent capitalist, farmer and wage-earner.

THE GENERAL ELECTION.

Rumors of an early Dominion election are still rife in Government circles at Ottawa, and it would not surprise us if the report recently sent to a Winnipeg paper—that a dissolution in March was meditated—had good foundation. Months ago, the ADVERTISER published the fact that it had undoubted information that the Ottawa Conservative managers feared that delay in appealing to the people would result in hurting, rather than improving their prospects. Then some of our friends reminded us of the Government pledge at last session of Parliament that there would be no election till after another year, the opinion was divided as to the propriety of the step, but events have been taking place that tend to increase the probability that an early election will be decreed.

The full effects of the McKinley Bill and the restrictionist policy on both sides of the border which it betokens will not be felt till next fall. Last year our farmers and dealers rushed over their surplus barley, eggs, beans, peas, horses, sheep, cattle and other products, for which there is a demand in the States, before the increased tariff was levied. Thus, as was recently pointed out by Prof. Shaw, of the Agricultural College, our producers escaped the worst portion of the squeeze. But in the ensuing season it will be increasingly felt. The Government at Ottawa by its dilly-dallying and its high tax policy, so largely responsible for this state of affairs, naturally desires to avoid this after-clap, and that is one good reason why an early general election is thought of. They desire to postpone the inquiry into the serious charges of corruption and conniving at wrong-doing brought against Sir Hector Langevin by Mr. Tarte, ex-M. P., who has hitherto been a supporter of the Conservative party. The depths of the contract-breaking inquiry seem to be appalling, and an awakened public conscience cannot be expected to condone wrong-doing in high places. If the election could be rushed on before an inquiry was completed it would be counted a big stroke of policy.

Above all there is the fact that reciprocity proposals have been made by Secretary Blaine, of the United States, to the Dominion Government. These proposals are understood to favor unrestricted reciprocity, or, as Sir Charles Tupper said, are "an unrestricted offer of reciprocity." To meet Parliament with such an offer, and to be asked to give an honest reciprocity opinion upon it, would be very embarrassing for the trimmers in the Conservative party who now blow hot or blow cold in regard to reciprocity as opportunity offers. It would be especially confusing for Sir John Macdonald to formulate a straightforward reciprocity policy at present in view of the twistings and turnings and inconsistencies of his Cabinet and of the Conservative papers. "How much easier," he no doubt argues, "in a general way to assert that I favor reciprocity, and go to the country with a non-committal policy that will enable me to pocket the subscriptions of the combines while making the people believe that a comprehensive reciprocity treaty will be negotiated."

We confess that, in view of the temptations offered and the past record of the one-man power at Ottawa, it would be no surprise to us if the general election is precipitated. If it is delayed, the policy will not be dictated by respect for the constitution, but because the policy of "drift" and of "non-commitment" is preferred. It would, in fact, be a confession of weakness.

PERSONAL AND GENERAL.

The great Mount Carmel ship has been sent to Chicago by an air line, but not by a line in the air. So far, it seems to be classed with Keely's motor; it is always about to go, but it does not do it.

The nomination of Hon. Wm. Ross, ex-collector of customs at Halifax, as Liberal candidate for the House of Commons for Victoria, C. B., has been well received. Hon. Mr. Ross is an able and popular man. His nomination, which is held to betoken his election, comes at an opportune moment. The public account for last year have just been printed, and in a list of civil servants who have left the employ of the Dominion Government appears the name of Mr. Ross. In all other cases the reason for dispensing with the services of the retiring employee is given, but in that of the ex-collector at Halifax the "cause" column is left blank. And for the very good reason that there was no legitimate reason. The office which Mr. Ross held was ably managed by him, but it was wanted for a needy partisan and Mr. Ross was turned out. It was disgraceful treatment of a tried and faithful servant.

Though the judges reserved decision in reference to a point raised in the unseating of Mr. Stinson, the Conservative candidate for Hamilton, the legal fraternity generally believe that the reserved point cannot save him. It is held that Justice Ferguson's remark to Mr. Meredith practically settled it: "We have no doubt as to the result, but will hear counsel on the matter." If Mr. Stinson is foolish enough to carry the case to the Appeal Court he can keep Mr. Gibson out of the seat for this session and necessitate the Provincial Secretary finding a constituency elsewhere. But the unseated man cannot hold his seat or vote in the Legislature pending an appeal. That little scheme, which some of the clever Conservative editors have arranged, is effectually nullified by the Revised Statutes of Ontario (1887), chap. 10, sec. 62. Perhaps on second con-

sideration Mr. Stinson will not appeal, and will allow the Provincial Secretary to occupy the seat which he has held since 1879 with signal ability, profit to the Province, and honor to the Ambitious City.

Hon. Mr. Kirkpatrick, another prominent Conservative, must be classed with Mr. Colby, Mr. Carling and others of the Conservative managers as opposed to reciprocity in natural products. Mr. Kirkpatrick has been telling a meeting of farmers in Frontenac county that reciprocity in farm products would work enormous injury to the farmers. Another section of the Conservative party argues that reciprocity in coal and iron would seriously injure Canadians. Still more of them say that though they, by their own reasoning, are willing to do immense injury to the farming community by arranging for reciprocity in farm products alone, they could never think of counteracting the combined exertions of reciprocity in sugar, cotton and other necessities of life. Practically their proposal is, "Never mind the farmers, but save, oh! save the combines!"
