CHINA DOESN'T WORRY.

About the Advent of a German Force in Kiao-Chau Bay.

London, Nov. 19 .- The Berlin correspondent of the Times says: In the absence of official intelligence as to the relations between China and Germany, the cabinet is undecided as to the course to pursue in the event of China's refusal to accede to the German demands. Probably in that case a prolonged occupation would be necessary.

According to a special dispatch from Shanghai, Admiral Von Diedrich, com-mander of the German cruiser Division, before landing marines at Kiao-Chau on Monday morning, notified the British, French and Russian admirals of his intentions, and it is said that the Russian admiral expressed approval. The Chinese do not appear to be much distressed over the matter, declaring that Russia, Germany and France are preparing to attack Japan, and will use Kiao-Chau as a naval
