MILLER AT GRAND RAPIDS. Grand Rapids, Mich., Dec. 13.-Miller, the winner of the great six-day bicycle race in New York, is quite well known in this city. Miller was brought to this city by Charles N. Halstead, a local advertising manager, last win-Mr. Halstead was in Chicago, and saw the young man riding a "home trainer" in the window of the Willoughby-Hill store. It was one of those arrangements by which a rider could sit on his wheel and ride in a stationary position just as though he was on the track. It was a novelty, and Mr. Halstead induced Miller to come over here with his apparatus for the pure food show, at \$15 a week. Miller was little more than a very green and un-couth foreigner, who had little experi-ence in his own country and less here. When he was taken to the Livingston Hotel he could not even order his meals. Everything was strange to him and he provoked much amusement. But he could ride. And he showed a wonderful constitution. He rode in the window of the Boss Norton store for a short time, and afterward went into a little match with Jay Tinkham at the St. Cecilia building. He was known here then as "The Flying Dutchman," and no one became acquainted with him but marveled at his powers. He rode in windows where the ventilation was bad, the air foul and the heat often intense, and yet he never seemed to mind it at all. He knew nothing whatever about training, would eat enough for several men, and of any kind or quality which suited his fancy. He left the city in the spring, and it is believed that he put himself into the hands of a trainer for this race.

DEGRADING SPORT.
