Week of Torture.

LAST HOURS OF THE RACE.

New York, Dec. 12.—Just 15 men out
of the 25 who started on the six days
struggle lasted till the finish. No won-
der, it was a heart-breaking, killing
race. All day long they waded. No
one could change his position. Miller,
black score board that has started the
race for six long, weary days. A few had to ride late
at beat out Riviere and Moore, who
had places on that board, though out
of the race. Some did it; others fail-
ing just before the finish. Miller was
left in all that big Madison Square
Garden.

When the announcer's pistol in-
dicated that the last lap of the 142 hour
race was at hand, the vast audience
rose to its feet and cheered like mad.

Around the track the men sat on their
saddles, with Miller, who had been
in the lead, with Schinner, Rice,
Hale and Waller following, with the
others in a bunch. Anna Heid, who
had been waiting in a box opposite
the official stand, stepped out on the
track and bestowed a gorgeous wreath
of violets and roses on the victor, Mil-
ler then remounted his horse, and
holding the wreath aloft, dashed
around the track twice. When he dis-
mounted he grasped the hand extended
by Hale, whom he had shown of his
glory, and made a little speech. Hale
escorted Miller around the track, and
moved along the crowd shrieking itself
hoarse. There were cries for Rice,
and the sturdy miner, accompanied by
his trainer, Mike Murphy, followed the
others. To show his marvelous staying
powers Miller again got astride of his
wheel, and following a pacing machine,
rode two miles in a little over five
minutes, and at that he showed but
little signs of the fatigue he must
have suffered. Then the others filed
around the track and were finally
gathered together and bundled off to
the various hotels to sleep.

As a reward for his work of pain
and torture in covering hundreds of
miles a wheel, Miller will get \$1,500,
aside from the presents from wheel
men and the crowd. \$1,300 of this is
winner's share of the purse, and \$200
more goes for breaking the record. Joe
Rice's share of the purse will be \$800,
and Schinner will get \$500. Today Hale
will receive \$350, and Waller \$50 less.
Pierce gets \$200, golden \$150, Gannon
\$125, Enterman and Riviere \$100 each,
and Elkes \$75. The Fourth avenue end
of Madison Square Garden was sur-
rounded by an immense mob Satur-
day night after the bicycle race. Mil-
ler caught a glimpse of the riders.
As soon as the riders could be got into
the street clothed and well bundled up
they were hustled into carriages and
driven to hotels. So dense was the
crowd that the aid of the police had
to be called in order to get the half
dozen riders from the entrance to
the curb. With the exception of Rice,
Enterman, Miller and Schinner, none
of the men seemed to have with them
any mental effect from their long ride.
All of the men named had to be given
narcotics to quiet them.

Waller, who was fifth man, exhibited
the spasmodic energy which character-
ized his riding when he was in the
lead. He was evidently making a de-
perate effort to overhaul Hale, and he
appeared to be in excellent condition.
Hale kept up his steady pace and took
things quite coolly. About 11 o'clock
Rice confided to his trainer that the
side of his head was coming off. He
insisted that he would lose it, so a
large bandage was tied around his
head and he was satisfied. The report
that Riviere's leg was broken is un-
true. The police surgeons made an-
other descent upon the garden just
before 5 o'clock in the afternoon, and
two of the riders were ordered from
the track. All the contestants were
made to submit to examinations, and
all except Golden and Gannon were
pronounced able to go on. These two
men were almost tied for seventh place
and neither would quit the track un-
less the other did. The surgeons ap-
pealed to the trainers to take the two
men off, but they declined. The sur-
geons then took matters in their own
hands, and the men were dragged from
the track.

Ontario Rugby Union.

Toronto, Dec. 12.—The annual meeting
of the Ontario Rugby Football Union
was held here Saturday, at which Pre-
sident A. B. Ford presided. The meet-
ing was one of the largest in the history
of the union, and there were two clubs
admitted, they being Ottawa City, who
have left the Quebec union, and the
other was the Argonaut Rowing Club,
who have entered a team in the senior
series. A. G. Slaght and C. A. McDou-
gall represented the Argonauts, and the
treasurer showed a balance of over
\$900. Secretary Fitzgibbon was voted
\$100 as a mark of appreciation for work
done during the year.

A motion that the executive should
choose a board of referees, and that
they be paid \$10 per game in the senior
series, and \$5 per game in the interme-
diate and junior series, besides their ex-
penses, out of the gate receipts, was carried.
It was carried that members of the
executive who did not reside in the
town or city where the executive meet-

ings were held be allowed 5 cents a mile
for traveling expenses, but nothing to
be allowed for hotel expenses. These
were the only important amendments
introduced and carried.

ston; first vice, R. H. Eason, T. A. C.
Lorne; second vice, J. McDonald, Mo-
nat; secretary-treasurer, J. McDun-
nough; George Gale, T. A. C. Lorne; E.
W. Jones, Brockville; R. R. Kingston,
Osgoode; J. S. Robertson, Wellington.
