Wrecked in a Tunnel

Awful Disaster at One of Phila delphia's Suburbs.

Two Trains Collide at Full Speed and Then Take Fire.

The Loss of Life Supposed To Be Very

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 24. — A terrible wreck occurred this morning about 9:10 o'clock. The scene of the accident is at West Manayunk, a suburb of this city about 10 miles distant. It seems the Shamoken express on the Reading road due here at 9:30, and carrying a large number of passengers was the ill-fated train. This train usually leaves the upper coal regions Monday morning loaded with workmen and laborers who are employed along the line, and who take advantage of the Sunday rest to go home on Saturday night and spend the holiday with their families. It would appear that the passenger train entered the tunnel at West Manayunk at regular speed and ran into a coal train with disastrous results. The first rumor to reach the city was to the effect that eight persons had been killed and a number injured. This was followed later by the more alarming statement that no less than 28 lives had been lost, and later still the figures rose to the appalling total of 52 killed. Inquiry at the offices of the company met with no information. The officers admitted there had been a wreck, but refused to give any further information or even the slightest detail. It was learned, however, that the wreck had taken fire and was burning rapidly in the tunnel. The chances of reacuing such of the passengers as are in the burning cars are slim.

Mitchell, in the western part of the city, Mrs. Mitchell and her neighbor, William Walrod, own ugly dogs and the boy crossed to the lar side of the street to avoid them. Mrs. Mitchell's dog, however, ran across and attacked him and the Walrod dog, which had been chained, broke loose and joined in the attack. The boy fought desperately for his life. His only weapon was a small pocket knife, and the cuts he gave the dogs only served to increase their fury. Screaming for aid, the little fellow was borne to the ground. Before help reached him the dogs had bitten him in over 50 places. They were literally eating him alive. The flosh was all eaten from one leg. The bone was as clean as if parboiled. One arm was stripped and other portions of the body were horribly mangled. He died shortly after help arrived.

At a signal the circle closed in, securing the police force of the town, and rode to the cabins of two colored men. Jack Wilson was killed and his wife badly beaten.
