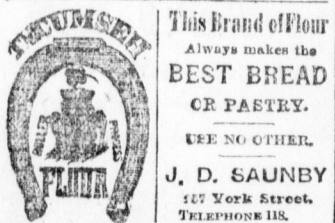

Toronto, Aug. 2—11 p.m.—Since last night there has been a slow movement eastward of the high pressure area and of the two depressions. The weather has been fine throughout the Dominion and over most of the Northwest intensely warm. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Edmonton, 54°—66°; Calgary, 59°—84°; Edmonton, 54°—78°; Battleford, 66°—98°; Prince Albert, 66°—86°; Medicine Hat, 68°—100°; Qu'Appelle, 58°—98°; Winnipeg, 66°—88°; Toronto, 54°—76°; Montreal, 56°—72°; Quebec, 62°—70°; Halifax, 52°—80°.

To drive red ants out of a cupboard, place in it an earthen dish containing a pint of tar over which two quarts of hot water have been poured.

If long standing, walking or any sort of pressure has made the feet painfully red, bathe twice a day in warm water and dust with equal parts of precipitated chalk and tannin.

When the eyes are inflamed apply a soft old handkerchief dripping with water as hot as can be borne.

McCarthy's Picnic.

It is understood by those interested in the McCarthy movement that a series of picnics will be held this autumn in different parts of the Province, commencing immediately upon Mr. McCarthy's arrival from England. The campaign will be pushed vigorously, and dates are being arranged at the following points: Owen Sound, Hagersville, Port Hope, Milton and Cookstown.

The Young Liberal Picnic.

Make no engagement for next Wednesday, Aug. 9, for on that day the Young Liberal Club will hold their first annual picnic at Queen's Park. It promises to be a grand affair and the picnic of the season. The Young Liberal Picnic—composed of H. M. S. Little, H. M. S. Gibbons, H. M. S. Macbeth, H. M. S. Hobbs and H. M. S. Reid—with drum and bugle band and six Highland pipers, will form at Armory No. 2 and march to the park. Here a splendid programme of athletic sports resembling the Athenian games held in the Roman amphitheaters will be carried out. The attractions will include slack-wire performances, glass ball shooting, steepchase races, exhibitions by jugglers and tumblers, etc. The programme will certainly be a grand one, and no doubt the crowd at the park will number almost the city's entire population. The Young Liberals are determined that their first picnic shall be a success.

LONDON'S BICYCLE TRACK.

Progress of the Movement to Make London the Wheeling Head-Quarter for Western Ontario.

Agreeable to the suggestions of President Porte, the Western Fair Board's executive committee will hold a special meeting to consider the possibility of entering into a half-payment arrangement with the City Council in regard to the construction of a bicycle course at Queen's Park.

Thomas A. Brown, secretary of the board, recently wrote to the city engineer asking him to secure a suitable site for the probable cost which would be entailed. This the efficient assistant, Mr. Robert Ironsides, has done. The outlay necessary will be in the neighborhood of \$1,300. The amount needed for grading purposes alone is stated at \$375, while the procuring of sufficient team to make a six-inch bed beneath the cinders will add another \$500. If the latter constructive assistance has to be purchased the expense, of course, will be materially increased. Such a contingency, however, is unlikely, as the two railway companies, together with a number of the leading manufacturers, would, it is asked, likely assist in this particular.

The amount of grading needed to complete the track is one of the most serious obstacles to the successful termination of the project, but this fact should not deter the board from extending assistance, as the helms in the center of the course will in any event at some time have to be filled.

AND FROM THE CITY COUNCIL.

The following document, which will be presented at the next meeting of the City Council for the cognition of that body, explains itself:

Gentlemen.—The undersigned, representing officially the various cycling organizations in the city, desire you to give consideration to the question of a bicycle track for London.

At a meeting of the Western Fair Board, the members expressed their interest in the project in accordance with such an idea, and are willing to give any practicable and well-advised scheme of this nature financial aid. We are of the opinion that if the city will grant a sum equal to that of the Western Fair Board—the gross cost of constructing a cinder path is readily ascertainable—the track could be built within a very short time. The interest of every cyclist in this desirable undertaking is necessarily obvious and assured.

We need not point out the necessity of having a suitable bicycle track here. The pastime—affording healthy recreation—has against which no possible objection can be urged. At every meet held, hundreds and even thousands will be attracted to our city. Both these points should actuate you in giving the proposal a favorable dictum. The accuracy of the latter statement especially has been repeatedly demonstrated at the annual convening of the Canadian Wheelmen's Association. People from all over Canada, as well as from contiguous portions of the United States, are then drawn together in great numbers.

Small provincial towns, such as Toronto, Montreal, Woodstock, N. S. W. Williams, etc., have bicycle tracks. Why should London be a laggard in this particular?

The track proposed is one-third of a mile, to be laid out within the present horse race course at Queen's Park.

Begging that you will give this matter the thought that its importance deserves, your petitioners will ever pray.
