FRANCE MOVED
As She Has Not Been Since the Fall of Sedan.

Far-Reaching Effects of Col. Henry's Confession of Forgery—Wholesale Resignation of Army Officers May Follow.

Paris, Sept. 2.—Col. Henry's confession of having forged the famous document upon which the authenticity of which Gen. De Boisdeffre, chief of staff in the French army, in his impassioned appeal to the jury in the Zola trial, staked his own reputation and the honor of the army, and Col. Henry's suicide in the fortress of Montevideo, have caused a commotion throughout France which has not been witnessed since the fall of Sedan.

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Dervishes Attacked

The Anglo-Egyptian Army Pushing Forward.

Skirmish With the Enemy—Native Loss Not Ascertained.

Telegraphic Communication Interrupted by a Severe Storm.

Startling Reasons Given for the Czar's Peace Proposals.

No Disarmament for Germany—Chamberlain's Mission to This Country.

London, Sept. 2.—The war office was relieved late last evening by the receipt of a dispatch from Cairo, explaining the sudden interruption of news from the Soudan. It appears that telegraphic communication was interrupted by the wire beyond Nari Island, about midway between Metem-Nie and the sixth cataract of the Nile, having been damaged by a severe storm.

Shortly after the arrival of this intelligence came the following dispatch from Nari Island, dated Aug. 30: "There have been glimpses of the enemy during the last few days, and the first skirmish took place on the eighth mile north of Omdurman. The enemy showed a disposition to fight, beating war drums and displaying battle bunting. The Montmorency troop carried a few dervish saddles, and three gunboats steamed up the river in front of the town and shot the dervish positions. The enemy's loss could not be ascertained, as the dervishes were in a hollow; but fleeing troops could be seen. Yesterday it advanced four miles in close formation."

Until the receipt of the above news Great Britain was beginning to be alarmed lest the fate of Hicks Pasha had befallen the Anglo-Egyptian army under the airdar, General Sir Herbert Kitchener. On Monday night the army was 23 miles from Omdurman, the dervish camp near Khartoum, where the Khalifa was reported to be waiting with 100,000 warriors, well equipped with field guns. General Kitchener's force consisted of 10,000 British troops and 15,000 Egyptian troops, the most perfectly equipped force the government has ever put in the field, having plenty of horse artillery and machine guns.

To keep constant communication with the army by field telegraph, hence the fears that the Anglo-Egyptian army would have been overwhelmed by numbers.

FRENCH SCHEME THAT FAILED.
London, Sept. 2.—William Wilson, editor of the London Year Book and the same time Mr. Heaton predicts an increase of one-half in correspondence the first year as a result of the reduced rate. Deducting the amount of postage receivable in this increase, namely, £29,861, from Britain's gross contribution of £25,639, the net result is a contribution of £4,222. Mr. Heaton finds that the boon of penny postage will cost Britain £29,724, and the colonies will contribute £12,950, or £16,974. Thus, Mr. Heaton observes, to make imperial penny postage complete, only a sacrifice of £13,960 is required by the British colonies of Australia. The same article says Canada has reason to complain of the unsatisfactory system, but says it may be regarded as tolerably certain that Mr. Mulock will soon give this subject his attention.

CABLE NOTES.
Blance Roosevelt, the American writer, is seriously ill in London of brain trouble.

It is only in official circles that the scheme for a Pacific cable is boomed. In Canadian commercial circles it is thought that the cable would be of no advantage to Canada.

Revolution is feared in Ecuador; the cabinet has resigned, and congress has suspended, until military protection can be secured. An incipient revolt has been crushed at Lima.

The colored population of Jamaica is opposed to annexation to the United States, and Commissioner Burke, of Jamaica, goes to the Barbadoes conference uninvited on the question. In British Guiana or Barbadoes does not take the initiative matter will fall through.

RUSSIA DYING.
A special cable from London says: England's greatest leader, after Lord Salisbury, has an inspired and cynical article in a London newspaper, showing that the Russian cabinet, and shrewd move, made necessary by the increased physical degeneracy of the Russian race. The following facts are quoted to prove it: The death rate in Moscow for the week ending July 27 was 44 per thousand, which is more than three times above that of London. In many Russian districts the death rate is 70 in 1000, and in all Russian cities the death rate has a minimum of 35 and a maximum of 171 per thousand. Nijni Novgorod is steadily dwindling; Kazan is a vast churchyard.

There is an increasing difficulty in finding young men to serve in the Russian army. As for the navy, only the other day the news came from Odessa that Russia, finding the greatest difficulty in recruiting her marine from the seaport towns, was compelled to fall back on the clumsy and stupid peasants of the interior.

NOT FOR GERMANY.
The Berliner Post, in a seemingly inspired article with reference to the French disarmament proclamation of Emperor Nicholas, says: "Germany must remain armed and on guard until France is willing to convert her weapons into plough shares."

GHASTLY OBJECT LESSONS.
London, Sept. 2.—The Madrid correspondence of the Daily Chronicle says: The lower classes are deeply, and perhaps dangerously, impressed by the ghastly appearance of the repatriated soldiers from Santiago de Cuba.

GONE UP IN SMOKE!

Between \$60,000 and \$70,000 Lost by a Toronto Blaze.

Shipbuilding Works of the Bertram Company Destroyed.

Toronto, Sept. 2.—About 1 o'clock this morning a fire started in the Bertram engine and shipbuilding works, corner of Bathurst and Niagara streets, and within an hour the premises were gutted. A general alarm was rung, and almost all the reels in the city were soon playing on the fire, but it made rapid headway and the building and machinery are totally destroyed.

The loss is estimated at \$60,000 to \$70,000.

In the yards was the fine new steamer of the Ontario and Quebec Company, the City of Toronto, valued at \$250,000, which was to have been placed in commission in a week or two. At 2 a.m. the fire was under control, and the steamer was saved. The lumber yards were in
