INCREDIBLE BARBARITY

Ghouls at Galveston Mutilate the Dead.

Fingers and Ears Cut From Corpses to Secure Jewelry—Over Fifty of the Biped Hyenas Shot.

Dallas, Sept. 13.—W. H. McGrath, manager of the Dallas Electric Company, reached here yesterday, direct from Galveston. He said: "Vandalism in Galveston has been horrible. The most rigid enforcement of martial law has not been able to suppress it entirely. Adjutant-General Scurry's men have arrested a hundred or more negroes, 43 of whom were found with effects taken from dead bodies. These were tried by court-martial. They were convicted and ordered shot. One negro had 23 fingers, with rings on them, in his pockets."

During the robbing of the dead, not only were fingers cut off, but ears were stripped from the head in order to secure jewels of value. A few government troops who survived have been assisting in patrolling the city. Private citizens have also endeavored to prevent the robbing of the dead, and on several occasions have killed the offenders.

OVER FIFTY SHOT.
Singly and in twos and threes the offenders were thus shot down until the total of those executed exceeded fifty. POCKETS FULL OF HUMAN FINGER-RINGS.

Houston, Texas, Sept. 12.—It is true that negroes were shot by order of a court-martial. Their pockets were found to be full of human fingers and jewelry, of which the dead had been stripped.

SITUATION IMPROVING.
Galveston, Texas, noon, by tug to Houston, Sept. 12.—The White Cotton Sewer Men's organization held a meeting Monday night and tendered their services, that of 500 able-bodied men, to the public to clear the streets of debris. Big forces were at work Monday night, and the situation is much improved so far as the passage of vessels is concerned.

UNDER MARTIAL LAW.
The city was patrolled Monday night by regular soldiers and citizen soldiery. No one was allowed on the streets without a pass. Several negroes were shot for not halting when ordered. It is reported that three of the citizen soldiery were shot by negroes.

WATER AND PROVISIONS.
The steamer Lawrence arrived here early yesterday morning from Houston with water and provisions. A committee of 100 citizens were aboard, among them doctors and cooks.

Work on the waterworks is being rushed, and it was hoped to be able to turn a supply on yesterday afternoon. The relief committee met at 9 p.m. yesterday. It is also badly in need for disinfectants. A large load of lime at this time would be a blessing.

HURRIED BURIALS.
Dead bodies have decomposed so much that it is impossible to send them to sea for burial. The water has receded so far, however, that it is possible to dig trenches, and bodies are being buried where found. The debris covering bodies is being burned where it can be done so safely.

ICE AND WATER WANTED.
Dallas, Texas, Sept. 12.—A bulletin from Galveston, via Virginia Point and Houston, received here at 11 a.m. says: "The situation grows worse every minute; water and ice needed. People in frenzy from suffering from these causes. Scores have died since last night and a number of sufferers have gone insane."

WIPED OUT.
New York, Sept. 12.—G. W. Angie received a dispatch today from Houston, Texas, informing him that Angleton, 40 miles out of that place, had been wiped out. Quarantone, on the mouth of the Brazos River, had every house but twelve razed. Thirty lives were lost in both towns.

BUSH FIRES

Several Farms Near Inniskip Swept by Flame.

Woodstock, Sept. 13.—To east and west of the town, Tuesday night, the sky was lurid with the reflections of bush fires, and anxiety ran high because of the fierce wind that swept from the west. The glare from the northeast was particularly fierce, and at times even the leaping flames could be discerned faintly outlined over the tree-tops. It was a wild night, and the thankfulness was general that the conflagrations were no nearer.

The larger was raging through a mile and a half of timber land to the south-east of Inniskip and the great flames shot up above the highest tree-tops. It began on the Benjamin Blidiss farm from some stumps that had been burning since Saturday, and the wind soon fanned it into a fire of large proportions. As the blaze gained strength it soon ran to the farm of Thomas Miller, and roaring and crackling crossed to George Carter's, thence to Jas. Bartley's, and the big farm owned by S. Trachsell. The flames made travel on the fifth concession impossible, and the place was cut off from all communication.

The fire raged for hours and was only prevented from spreading by a heavy shower that fell at 1 a.m. No dwellings were consumed so far as known. The damage done will be great. There were 250 cords of cut wood on the Bartley farm and S. Trachsell had 75 or 80 head of cattle, whose fate has not yet been learned. The timber land over which the fire swept is not of any great value, but the fire may extend to the Robinson farm, where the timber is much more valuable. Hundreds of people from the vicinity of Inniskip watched the huge conflagration for hours, and in the village itself it was possible to read by the light of the blaze 1½ miles away.
