The Fire Department.

Chief Roe Submits His Annual Report.

Interesting Record of Its Work During the Year.

Figures of Losses, Insurance and Ex-perditure Compared with Former Years—Electric Light Plant.

Perditure Compared with Former Years—Electric Light Plant.

At last night's meeting of No. 3 committee Chief Roe submitted his twentieth annual report, a summary of which is given. "The year has been prolific in accidents to members of the department," the report reads. "Six members received injuries while in the performance of their duties. Fortunately none of the cases had a stat termination, although some of them were of a very serious nature. The loss of time resulting therefrom aggregated nineteen weeks. The accidents to apparatus and horses were few and of a very trivial character, showing careful handling on the part of those in charge."

The general conduct of the officers and men was then commended. A new hook and ladder truck wass badly needed. There were 3,500 feet of first-class hose, 600 feet of second-class and 1,100 feet of third-class cotton hose in service. The buildings were all in good repair except the old shed in rear of No. 1 station. The transfer of W. Smith to No. 1 station. The transfer of W. Smith to No. 1 station to take charge of the repairs to apparatus had resulted satisfactorily, and showed a great saving in cost of blacksmithing repairs as well as new ironwork required. The chief renewed his resommendation that legislation be secured to reserve the tops of all poles for the exclusive use of the fire alarm wires. He also drew the committee's attention to the immense network of wires on Richmond and Dundas streets and to the loose manner in which they were strung, recommending that immediate action betaken and Dundas streets and to the loose man-ner in which they were strung, recom-mending that immediate action be taken to have all the wires put underground. In the meantime he would suggest that the electric light company be asked to have a man attend all fires for the purpose of shutting off their current or cutting the wires.



MARKET CLERK'S REPORT.

"Although I have kept the Covent Market House open longer than the bylaw calls for, yet I am unable to please everybody," said Clerk Wilson in clause I of his report.

This matter was laid over until next meeting when some of the tenants of the market are expected to be present to express their views.

Clause 2 — The question of allowing auctioneers to sell on the market square has been the cause of trouble for some years. I inclose some leters which will show that I am not responsible for it.

EECTRIC LOHIT PLANT.


A letter was received from City Clerk Kingston, calling attention to the mayor's reference, in his inaugural address, to the purchase of an electric light plant.
