Toronto, April 20—11 p.m.—The severe  
storm mentioned last night has since moved  
slowly northward to Wisconsin, where it is  
now central. It has given unusually heavy  
easterly gales throughout the lake region,  
as well as heavy rains. Elsewhere in Canada  
the weather has been generally fine. Mini-  
mum and maximum temperatures: Equi-  
valent, 38°-46°; Calgary, 18°-44°; Qu-  
Appelle, 10°-32°; Winnipeg, 28°-34°;  
Port Arthur, 18°-38°; Toronto, 34°-35°;  
Montreal, 28°-48°; Quebec, 22°-38°; Hal-  
ifax, 36°-46°.

Toronto, April 21, a. m.—Probabil-  
ities for the next 24 hours for the lower  
lakes region (covering the peninsula and  
as far east as Belleville) are: Strong  
winds and gales, gradually shifting to the

—Mr. Allan Goodburne, of the East End,  
is lying seriously ill at his son's residence,  
Elizabeth street, of inflammation of the  
lungs.

—Charles Campbell, late western  
traveler for Scandrett Bros., London, is in  
town looking up a location for a grocery  
business.—[Windsor Record.]

—Mr. Blakeby, traveling agent of the  
Oddfellows' Relief Association, Kingston,  
paid a fraternal visit to Chorazin Lodge,  
No. 190, at their last meeting.

—The services in the Presbyterian  
Church, Port Stanley, on Sunday next  
will be conducted by Rev. J. Allister  
Murray, M.A., of St. Andrew's Church,  
this city.

—"Wives and Daughters," now published  
jointly at Toronto and London, is out for  
the current month. It is an unusually  
good number, and typographically as  
pretty as a picture.

—Miss Alice Spence, teacher of typewriting  
at Coe's Shorthand and Typewriting  
Academy, left for Goderich yesterday  
where she has accepted the position of  
official court reporter.

—The strong wind of yesterday caused  
the collapse of a portion of a gable at the  
Canada Packing Company's buildings in  
course of erection near this city. The  
damage amounted to about \$50.

—The mail clerk on the St. Clair  
branch of the M. C. R. now runs through  
to London as well as those on the west  
division, their aid being needed to sort  
mail between here and London.

—The Presbytery of Honsan, China, in  
connection with the foreign mission field of  
the Canada Presbyterian Church, have  
appointed Mr. John Cameron, of this city,  
a commissioner to the next General As-  
sembly, which meets at Brantford in June.

—Mr. Joseph B. Tasker, of Toronto, a  
shrewd business man and a good traveler,  
has been engaged to represent the Canada  
Smelting and Refining Company of Lon-  
don, to travel between Chicago and New  
York. He will travel in Canada until the  
present duty on sweeps has been removed,  
which is expected any day now, as prom-  
ised by Hon. Clarke Wallace and the Min-  
ister of Finance.

—Miss Lizzie Gibson, who passed in in-  
dustrial design at the Government  
drawing examinations, has now a full set of  
certificates in the primary, advanced and  
mechanical courses, which is as many as  
can be obtained. It is said no other pupil  
in the district has succeeded in doing this  
before. Only two teachers in London  
possess equal certificates.

—Last night Manager Larmour, of the  
C. L. and P. S. T. and R. Company, visited  
the Port, and while there was waited upon  
by a deputation consisting of Messrs. Capt.  
Denning, Capt. Ellison, M. Payne and A.  
C. Brown, who asked that better accom-  
modation be granted for the shipment of  
their fish. Mr. Larmour promised that in  
ten days he would have a train leave the  
port about 1 p.m. on which fish can be  
shipped.—[St. Thomas Times.]

—Wm. C. Jordan and George Abell,  
charged with assaulting and molesting P.  
C. Addison while in the discharge of his  
duty, asked that their cases be adjourned  
until Wednesday at the Police Court this  
morning. Their request was granted. The  
case of George Belton, charged with keep-  
ing a vicious dog, was dismissed as it was  
shown that Frank Love owned the dog com-  
plained of. B. Furness paid \$1 for riding  
his bicycle on the sidewalk. One drunk  
was discharged.

—A happy gathering assembled yester-  
day at the residence of Mr. An-  
drew Hepburn, Government contract-  
or of Port Stanley, to wit-  
ness the marriage of his eldest daughter,  
Lizzie, to Mr. Alex. Taylor, one of Port  
Stanley's most popular townsmen. Rev.  
J. Wardell Black tied the nuptial knot in  
the presence of 50 invited guests from Lon-  
don, Guelph, Springfield, Fickerton and  
Port Stanley. The bride was attended by  
her sister, Miss Annie Hepburn, while Mr.  
Robert Hepburn waited on the groom.  
The bride is a charming girl in a dress of  
cream Bedford cord, trimmed with chiffon-  
lace, her maid being tastefully attired in a  
suit of lawn-colored goods, trimmed with  
lace. The couple left for Buffalo and the  
east on their honeymoon trip, and will live  
at the Port.

north. It was a most happy event. Miss  
Williams, daughter of Chief Williams, per-  
formed the pleasant duties of bridesmaid,

and Mr. John Tamlin, brother of the groom,  
was best man. Mr. and Mrs. Tamlin  
left on an extended wedding trip. They  
will reside on Oxford street, city.

**Threaten to Sue London.**

The St. Thomas City Council held a  
special meeting to consider their claim for  
\$509.90 on the secretary of the L. and P.  
S. R. board for rent alleged to be due the  
Railroad City from the G. T. R. It was  
moved by Ald. McCully, seconded by Ald.  
Duggett, that if the rent due the city from  
the Grand Trunk Railway Company be not  
paid by the 22nd, the city solicitor proceed  
to collect the same by law. Carried unani-  
mously.

**Artillery Association.**

The eighth annual general meeting of the  
Ontario Artillery Association was held at  
the Canadian Military Institute on Tues-  
day. The annual reports were submitted and  
adopted. The treasurer's statement showed  
a balance to the association's credit of \$540.  
The following officers for 1893 were elected:  
Major Mead, president; Lieut.-Col. A. H.  
Macdonald, Guelph; Major Van Wagner,  
Hamilton; Major McLean, Port Hope, and  
Capt. McNichol, Cobourg, vice-presi-  
dents; Mr. B. Myles, treasurer; Mr. L. H.  
Irving, secretary; Major King, St. Cathar-  
ines; Major Nicoll, Guelph; Capt. Hendrie,  
Hamilton; Major Davidson, Guelph, and  
Mr. Hesketh, London, committee of man-  
agement.

## THE BOARD OF WORKS

Transact General Business—The Cab  
stand changed—Application to Ex-  
tend Dufferin Avenue—Wreay  
Street Residents Complain  
of the Sewer.

The Board of Works held their regular  
meeting last evening. Ald. Garratt (chair-  
man), Dreaney, Taylor, Coe, Shaw and T.  
Jones, City Engineer Graydon and Secre-  
tary Bell were present.

Dr. F. R. Edey was granted permission  
to remove a number of trees from his boule-  
vard.

An application for a sidewalk on Hyman  
street, between Wellington and Waterloo  
streets, was laid over.

W. C. L. Gill, city registrar, complained  
that R. Southam dumped ashes in the lane  
adjoining his office, and asked that the  
board request him to discontinue doing so.  
Granted.

An application for a sidewalk on Ontario  
street, between Elias and King, was laid  
over.

John C. Mill requested that Dufferin  
avenue be opened from Quebec to Charlotte  
streets. Ald. Dreaney explained that pupils  
attending Quebec street school and living  
east of the school had to go around by Dun-  
das street. He moved that the chairman  
and city engineer look into the matter with  
a view of purchasing the property.

Ald. Garratt—Would the residents on  
each side of the proposed street be willing  
to give their property?

Ald. Dreaney—I think they would be  
foolish if they did.

The engineer will report on the matter.

James Court and others complained that  
on account of a defective sewer on Wreay  
street, South London, their cellars were re-  
peatedly flooded. The surface water flows  
in from Westminster township and causes  
the whole trouble. A ditch was necessary  
to carry off this water.

The city solicitor's opinion will be ob-  
tained on the matter.

Alex. Harvey asked that either survey-  
ers' monuments be put in on Talbot street  
north of that he is given the boundaries.

The city engineer said that there were  
very few monuments, none at all in East  
London or South London. In Toronto and  
Hamilton there were none.

No action was taken.

The Bell Organ and Piano Company had  
been served by the Medical Health Officer  
with a notice to connect their premises on  
Dundas street with the sewer. The city  
engineer had refused to grant them a per-  
mit to do the work unless they put a  
deposit of \$50 as required by bylaw.

This they did not agree to do, although  
they would be willing to pay for the work.

The Board of Health will be asked to  
put down the drain.

Hon. John Carling protested against the  
cab stand being situated in front of his  
block, Richmond street.

The stand will be changed to Carling  
street.

The caretaker of Victoria Park asked for  
a quantity of hose, that the boulevard be  
painted, and a number of trees—English  
elm and sycamore. Granted. His request  
for a boiler to heat the greenhouse was  
filed.

The artificial stone walk on King street  
will be commenced about May 1.

The engineer was instructed to call for  
tenders for new dump carts.

The pay sheet amounted to \$575.22, of  
which \$574.76 was for street cleaning.

The engineer will prepare a sketch of a  
bandstand for Victoria Park.

Ald. Coe advocated more extensive flower  
culture in the park, and suggested that  
local florists be allowed to establish flower  
beds there, and that prizes be offered for  
the best exhibit.

No action was taken in this matter.

It was decided to remove the wood mar-  
ket clerk's office to the new market, corner  
of Wellington and York streets.

## SOURCE OF THE TAXES.

Total Assessment in London This Year

Amounts to Nearly \$15,000,000—

Decrease on Income.

As a result of recent legislation every  
man in London has exemption from tax-  
ation on \$700 of his income. For this  
reason the total taxable assessment in the  
city is about \$100,000 less this year than it  
was last, notwithstanding that the assess-  
ment on property is \$100,000 more. The  
following statement has been prepared by  
the city clerk showing the total assess-  
ment:
