Powder Mill Explosion

FIFTY PERSONS REPORTED DEAD

And More Than Six Hundred Injured-Shock Was relt 200 Miles

Fontanet, Ind., Oct. 16 .- The residents of this village of 1,000 persons wnen they awoke this morning encountered a much different situation tnan tney had been accustomed to in the past. Instead of a quiet country town and pleasant scenery to greet their eyes desolation was at hand. Soldiers of the Indiana State militia were on hand and had stood guard all through the night.

Details as to what caused the terrible catastrophe of yesterday, when the Dupont powder milis biew up, killing propably 50, and injuring some 600 persons, were lacking. No one connected with the powder comapny could ascribe any reason for the explosion. Several rumors were circulated, one of the most probable that the machinery in the glazing mill became overheated from friction, and set fire to some loose powder, one glazing mill was the first to blow up, the other sections of the plant followed in rapid succession.
