"I amde a thorough investigation while in the east in regard to the alleged 'tipping bureau' of the New York Amercan club," sad President Johnson, "but I could not discover a scintilla of evidence to support the talk that was started sometime ago. Neither could I find out that Pitcher Ed. Walsh, of the Chicago American League Club, had ever said he believed there was such a system of signals employed.

"There is no one more concerned about it than myself, and I wll pay \$500 to any man who produces proof that any mproper signals were used.
