POWER BYLAW

Election One of the Most Hotly Contested in City's History.

MANY WOMEN AT POLLS

Passing of Measure Means Municipality Must Take 15,000-Horsepower.

Windsor, June 21.-In one of the hardest-fought contests on a bylaw that ever took place in the city, the ratepayers of Windsor, yesterday, by a majority of four votes, passed the Niagara power bylaw, authorizing the city council to issue bonds for \$100,-000 for the installing of a transmission line and station for supplying power to the city of Windsor and vicinity.

The vote started at 9 o'clock in the morning and the polls closed at 5 o'clock, with the vote standing 622 in favor of the bylaw and 618 against it. The passing of the bylaw means that the city may now enter into the contract with the hydro-electric commission of Ontario for extending the Niagara power from either, London, Ont., or St. Thomas, to the limits of the city of Windsor. The city is required by the commission to take 15,-000-horsepower, in order to have the line installed, and as they will only use a small part of this, the balance will be contracted for by the company that submits the best proposition. The Electrical Distributing Company has submitted a proposition. The voters flocked to the polls when they opened yesterday morning, and it was seen very early in the day that the vote polled would be as large as on any other question ever submitted to the citizens of Windsor, and it was predicted at 5:30 o'clock that though the margin was very small the measure had safely passed.

One feature of the election was the fact that a great number of women property owners exercised their right to vote on such questions. They were transported to and from the polls in automobiles. Nearly every automobile in the city and a great number of carriages were filled all day with voters being hurried to the polls.

The election was open to property owners only.
