Fire Sweeps Through a Russian City

St. Petersburg, June 20.—Ten persons are dead, 50 missing and fully 2,000 others are homeless as the result of a conflagration which swept over Mohlevo today, destroying more than 300 buildings.

Ten are known to have perished, and it is feared that the death list will be larger. It was thought that the entire town was doomed, and the panic of the inhabitants made organized efforts to fight the flames impossible. They finally burned themselves out. The city has a population of about 45,000, almost half of whom are Jews. It was among the latter that most of the casualties occurred.

Many Drank of Poisoned Water

Vienna, June 21.—Poisoning of the waters of a spring near Trau, in Dalmatia, is responsible for the immediate death of three religious processions, the probable fatal illness of 200 others, and the serious condition of at least another hundred.

It is reported that the water in the spring was contaminated with arsenic. The thirty paraders drank eagerly of the water and three died within a few minutes. Others became violently ill at once, and the religious observance was abandoned, the priests turning their attention to caring for the stricken men, women and children. Fifty of the processions were placed under arrest today charged with the murder of the attendant. The cause to the poisoning has been found.

Germany Worried Over the Kaiser

Berlin, June 21.—There is no concealing the fact that the nation has felt the most serious doubt and anxiety concerning the Kaiser's condition, and in spite of reassuring reports, there is still considerable uneasiness. Some diminution of this feeling was experienced, however, tonight, when Dr. Niedner, physician in ordinary to the

Emperor, allowed himself to be quoted as follows: "The Emperor is himself again. The attack on his knees has practically disappeared. Yesterday and today his majesty walked in the palace gardens without suffering the slightest discomfort." According to the present arrangements the Kaiser will leave Potsdam on Wednesday for Hamburg, where he will embark for Kiel.

THE TRADE FIGURES

Ottawa, June 20.—The figures of Canadian trade for May, issued today, show another record advance over last year. The total trade for the month was \$59,187,972, an increase of \$1,476,230 or over thirty per cent, as compared with May of last year.
