The "evil eye" being impounded and put away, two sturdy natives rushed forth and captured the pig, one seizing it by the ears and the other by the tail, deaf to its earnest protests. A dozen swarthy Formosan warriors surrounded the pig, and one of them delivered the death blow with

a spear. The natives tied the carcass to a pole, and having singed it over some burning straw, skinned it, and cut it into small pieces. These were boiled over charcoal fires. Three planks were elevated a few inches above the floor to form a table, and in a few minutes the bridal party came along with the boiled pork and a pile of macaroni. The ceremonial dishes were served out to the bride, the groom and guests, all of whom sat on their heels

at the low table. One of the bridesmaids next took up a portion of the meat, and uttering weird-sounding incantations, walked round the other guests, scattering small pieces of the meat right and left upon the floor. Then the entire party, seated with the viands in large bowls in front of each of them, began to sing a deep-voiced chant, in which lines sung solo were taken up in chorus.

This continued for about twenty minues, and then each of the guests, led by the bride and bridegroom, partook of a native distillation of rice. It was the preliminary to the marriage feast, which began immediately afterwards, the food disappearing in a few minutes with marvellous rapidity. Feasting thus quickly over, the bride and bridegroom took positions

opposite each other, and sang a quaint

Formosan chant, "Kai-kai-too-too-fong-ka-chee," which was interpreted

to mean, "We are now one-we love each other." The guests joined in the chorus with great gusto, and then followed a series of sacred war dances and chants invoking the return of the spirit of a departed Formosan hero, whose totem-pole was present as symbolic of his head.

The highly interesting ceremony was applauded at intervals by a crowd of white visitors, who surrounded the wedding party.
