At present Mr. Beck holds a Dominion charter for his Montreal concern at a capitalization of

\$100,000. The minister proposes to consolidate all the concerns under one company, with a capitalization of \$500,000. The heads of the various departments, the managers, and those employees whose seniority of service has won for them a status in the company, are all to be presented with a block of the stock and will be given the right and the opportunity from time to time to add to their holdings.
