

[BY HUGH S. FULLERTON.] Boston Braves are coming, and by their wonderful work during the past month they have established what

promises to be a record. Not since the Louisville club, hopelessly last in the old twelve-club league, started a final Eastern invasion and won 19 out of 21 games, has any club done what the Braves are doing now. After one of the worst starts in the history of baseball the Braves plugged along-never quit, kept working and fighting and during their last stay at home they rallied and Stallings got the team whipped into some sort of shape. By the time they were ready to start the Western trip the team was working together, the pitching had improved. and the team has simply waded through the league to victory.
