

SCOPE OF FEDERAL SUIT IS WIDENED

Will Include Individual Players of League as Well.

LINKER SOLD 3 TIMES

As Claim Contracts Violate Laws Against Servitude and Peonage.

CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 15.—Asking that the scope of the suit brought by the Federal League against organized baseball be widened to include the individual players of the Federal League, as well as the league itself, Lee Magee, manager of the Brooklyn Federal League club, today petitioned the United States district court for leave to file an intervening petition in the baseball injunction case.

The Brooklyn manager adopted the petition of the Federal League in its original bill, and prayed for the same relief as asked there. According to the counsel, the Magee petition raised the same questions as the league suit, but from the players' viewpoint, and asked the court specifically to adjudicate the relation which a player holds to organized baseball.

In an affidavit accompanying the petition, Joseph P. Fink, manager of the Chicago Federal League club, related that he had been sold three times by organized baseball without being consulted as to his wishes.

The affidavit of James Walsh, who left the Montreal International League club to join the Baltimore Federals, related in the original suit, contained the allegation that the letter of Sam D. Lichtenhein, manager of the Baltimore club, had been sold three times by organized baseball, and warned him that he would be blacklisted for three years.

WOUNDED PATIENT IS CLOSELY MASKED

Louvain Believes Mysterious Officer at Strassburg Is German Crown Prince.

BELGIAN DOCTOR CALLED

But Will Hazard No Guess at Identity of the Injured Man.

London, Jan. 15.—A Paris dispatch to the Daily News says: A remarkable story is published by the Belgian Vingtieme Siecle about a masked patient in Strassburg, whose identity is being kept secret by the Germans.

The story goes that Dr. Debaisieux, a professor of the University of Louvain, was recently summoned to a consultation at Strassburg, a motor car being placed at his disposal for the purpose of the military authorities.

When the professor entered the patient's room he noted with astonishment that the sufferer, who he was told was an officer who had been grievously wounded on the battlefield, was wearing a mask which completely concealed his features.

Dr. Debaisieux himself keeps the matter a profound secret, and when one of his friends tried to prevail on him to throw some light on the identity of his mysterious patient, he declined to say anything. It was through the indiscretion of a member of the headquarters staff at Louvain that the people there got wind of the affair.

At Louvain it is generally believed that the mysterious patient was the Crown Prince of the Netherlands, who has been assured by a German officer, with whom he is on friendly terms, that the man in the mask is not the Crown Prince, but another personage of the highest importance.

WHEAT DROPS FIVE CENTS.
Chicago, Jan. 15.—Selling out of immense quantities of wheat today smashed prices at a record. The extraordinary drop in values, directly followed announcements that an effort would be made to bring about a general embargo on exports of wheat from the United States. Much of the selling was a stop-loss character. The paralysis of demand was complete, so that it was impossible to execute orders. It was not long before strong firms took a hand at buying, and there was a reaction of 2 1/2 cents, which was followed by a further recovery to the level of \$1.10.

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
