Much of the selling was of a stop-loss character. The paralysis of demand was at times so complete that it was impossible to execute orders. It was not long hefore strong firms took a hand at buying, and there was a reaction of 24cc. Sensational weakness in wheat did not develop at the outset. Opening prices were at a moderate setback of ac to 14cc. The crumbling of quotations, when it did start, however, showed a swiftness seldom equalled.


