PENGUIN, BLUBBER
AND LIMPETS FARE
OF MAROONED CREW

Shackleton's Men on Elephant
Island Had Monotonous
Diet.

[Canadian Press.]
London, Sept. 11.—Life on Elephant
Island in the Antarctic, as it was experi-
enced by the marooned men of Lieut. Sir
Ernest Shackleton's South Polar expedi-
tion, who were recently rescued and
taken to Chile, is described in a mes-
sage received from Punta Arenas and
published in the Daily Chronicle today.

"The day began," says the description,
"with breakfast, which consisted mere-
ly of penguin, fried in blubber, with a
drink of water. The morning's duties
consisted of clearing away snowdrifts
and catching penguin. Lunch was served
at 1 o'clock, consisting of a biscuit and
raw blubber. The afternoon was occu-
pied with regular exercise over a track
100 yards in length.

"At 5 o'clock, when darkness fell,
came dinner, consisting of penguin
grease and beef tea. The men put pad-
ding in their boots and pipes were
carved from birds' bones. The members
of the party took turns in reading and
from the only available books, namely,
the Bible, an encyclopedia, Browning,
Bacon's Essays and Carle's French
Revolution. Saturday evening was al-
ways marked by a concert, the feature
of which was harp-playing. A harp
was the only musical instrument in the
camp.

"On one occasion there was a welcome
added to the diet when several impec-
cable fish were found in the stomach
of a seal and greatly enjoyed. These
were the only fish caught during our
stay. In August there was a change in
diet, when limpets were gathered and
seaweed was available as a vegetable.

"We were in the midst of one of these
limpet and seaweed lunches when the
rescue boat was sighted.

"When was the war over?" was the
first question we asked."

KILLED BY DYNAMITE
VANCOUVER, Sept. 10.—Mrs. A. H.
Gravener was blown to pieces and her
husband badly injured in an explosion
which destroyed their residence on
Cobbie Hill, Vancouver Island, Satur-
day evening. Gravener had stored
sixty cases of dynamite at his home.

The building caught fire and before the
firemen could reach it the dynamite
exploded. The noise of the explosion
was heard for miles around the coun-
try. Mrs. Gravener was an English
woman 40 years old and had lived at
Cobbie Hill ten years.

FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

THE LOCAL MARKET

The local market this morning was
not a large one, owing to the fact that
the majority of buyers secured a large
stock of produce on Saturday in prepa-
ration for rather small markets
throughout Fair week. A number of
loads of hay were brought in. The
demand was slow at \$12 to \$14 a ton.

It is stated that there will be prac-
tically no demand for hay at all on
Thursday and Friday of this week, as
these will be the two fair days. Straw
was scarce at \$8 to \$8.50 a ton.

Oats, both new and old, were scarce
as only one or two loads have been
brought in for some time. The old
brought \$1.50 to \$1.95 a cwt. The
new were sold at \$1.60 to \$1.68 a cwt.,
and 55c to 70c a bushel. Barley was
steady at \$1.35 a cwt., while wheat
brought \$1.20 to \$1.25 a bushel.

Potatoes were plentiful, but not of
good quality, the price remaining steady
at \$1.60 to \$2.25 a bushel. Tomatoes
were sold at 30c to 40c a basket. Corn
was steady at 10c to 15c a dozen. The
supply was plentiful, and is likely to
last until the frost sets in.

Sales of apples were made at 50c to
80c a bushel, and plums brought 30c
to 70c a basket. Peas were a little
cheaper at \$1 to \$1.30 a bushel. Peaches
were slightly higher, bringing from 60c
to 80c a basket. Cantaloupes, too,
were higher at \$1 to \$2.50 a dozen.
Grapes were slightly cheaper, at 25c
to 40c a basket. Creamery butter
brought as high as 40c a pound, and
dairy 35c. Eggs were scarce, as was
honey.

Poultry prices remained firm.
Fluctuations in hog prices, either
way, are expected during the week, as
a large shipment of hogs is likely to
arrive today. They sold for \$11.25 a
cwt. Dressed hogs were steady at \$15
to \$15.50. Hides and wool were steady.
