Citizens Get Together To Aid Leathorne Family

Large Garden Party To Be Staged At Home of William Attrell.

DONATE PROCEEDS

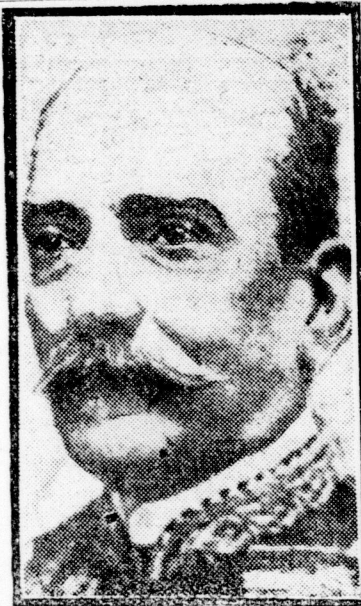
Daughter of Accident Victim Will Receive Medal For Bravery.

There will be a garden party given at the home of William Attrell, 1 Gore road, tonight, the proceeds of which will go to help the family of Richard Leathorne, who was killed by a railroad train on the night of June 21. There will also be a medal presented to Miss Susie Leathorne, daughter of the deceased, in recognition of her bravery at the fire in their home last November.

Mr. Leathorne was killed when he was taking a short cut across the C. N. R. tracks near Hale street. He was hurrying home to greet his wife, who was returning that night from the hospital, where she had been since the fire at his home. He was a deaf mute, and did not hear the approach of the train.

His daughter displayed the greatest courage last November, when an oil lamp blew up in a room where her mother and brother were sitting. When she heard their cries she ran into the room and led them to safety, risking the chance of being severely burned. A dog, the pet of the family, was also in the room, and was blinded by the fire. The little girl went back into the room and brought him out safely. Inspector Tustin of the Humane Society was asked to aid in making the garden party a success, and he has received permission to give the girl a medal in view of the bravery she displayed in rescuing the dog.

The garden party will be a community affair under the patronage of Mayor Wenig and several other city and county officials. A program has been arranged that will prove interesting to all who attend. The

party is in charge of Rev. L. W. Reid of the Hale Street Methodist Church, of which the Leathorne family are members.

This is one of the saddest cases to come into prominence in the city for a number of years, and the support of all is asked. The family will not have any claim against the railroad, as Mr. Leathorne was not on a public highway when killed. Although they possess several acres used to raise vegetables, this will not be sufficient to provide for the family, and every effort is being made to help them.

BRITISH AVIATOR CROSSING PACIFIC

Round-the-World Flier Hops Off From Minato, Japan.

Associated Press Despatch. Minato, Japan, July 13.—Conquering difficulties arising from engine trouble and a dense Pacific fog, A. Stuart MacLaren, British round-the-world aviator, arrived here from Kasumigaura at 5:32 p.m. today.

Tomorrow he will set forth on the long and perilous hop across the Pacific from this city, which is at the northern extremity of the main island of Japan.

On the Kasumigaura-Minato flight MacLaren was forced once to return to Kasumigaura owing to engine trouble and had to land twice en route because of thick fog, which made flying dangerous.

SHOT ENDS CHASE FOR STORE THIEF

Jim Kuzmac, ex-Convict and Gunman, Killed by Winnipeg Detectives.

Canadian Press Despatch. Winnipeg, July 13.—Jim Kuzmac, an ex-convict and "gun-toter," was shot and killed by Detective Alexander of the city force, Saturday night. The killing ended a week's search for Kuzmac, who was sought for breaking into a local drug store on July 6.

Early Saturday morning the wanted man was accosted by Detective Interpreter Colman at a downtown street. He put up a strenuous struggle and escaped, after firing a shot which narrowly missed the detective's head.

A motor squad from police headquarters started on the trail, which ended on the old exhibition grounds, several miles from the earlier encounter. Kuzmac sighted the officers first and started to run. Detective Alexander drew his gun, and aimed low, but just as he fired, the car struck a bump, throwing Alexander's aim up, and his bullet went high, lodging in Kuzmac's heart. A revolver and a quantity of ammunition were found in the fugitive's pocket.

Mike Kuzmac, a brother of the dead man, is held in connection with the drug store robbery and the robbing of a restaurant keeper, who was severely beaten.

MONTREALER DROWNS IN TWO FEET OF WATER

Three Swimming Fatalities Occur Near Montreal Over Week-End.

Canadian Press Despatch. Montreal, July 13.—Three swimming accidents occurred near the city over the week-end. All the victims were Montreal men.

E. Damsen, 45, was drowned near Boucherville in two feet of water. It is believed he was taken ill and fell face downwards in the water, drowning before his companions in a camp nearby were aware of the accident.

Joseph Eaton, 42, was drowned in the Soulanges Canal at Melochville this morning. Patrick Casey, a friend, was nearby drowned in trying to save him.

Thomas Fagan, 23, was drowned while bathing in the Lachine Canal on Saturday afternoon. It is thought he was seized with cramps.

MISSING BERKELEY PASTOR BRANDED WITH K.K.K. MARK

Oren C. VanLoon Located in Battle Creek in Serious Condition.

MEMORY GONE

Mysterious Telephone Call Leads To Finding After Eleven Days.

Associated Press Despatch. Battle Creek, Mich., July 13.—Rev. Oren C. VanLoon, pastor of Berkeley Community Church, near Detroit, who has been missing from his home for eleven days, was found here yesterday, suffering from heat, exhaustion and insufficient nourishment, and with the letters K. K. K. three inches high branded on his shoulder blades. Today he is at a hospital in a serious condition apparently ignorant of any of the events that have transpired since his disappearance.

Rev. VanLoon on several occasions has spoken from his pulpit against the Ku Klux Klan, and his friends said he had received a number of threatening letters.

A doctor who treated the pastor reported to the police, that in his opinion the three K's had been burned into Rev. VanLoon's back by hot metal. A mysterious telephone call in a woman's voice led to the finding of Rev. VanLoon. She refused to give her name.

TWO KILLED, SCORE HURT IN KANSAS WINDSTORM

Associated Press Despatch. Augusta, Kansas, July 13.—Two persons were killed and more than a score of others seriously injured when a severe windstorm struck here about 8:50 o'clock tonight. Scores of buildings on the main street of the town were demolished. The windstorm followed a heavy rain.

Muir's Mother Charges Youth Was Murdered

Associated Press Despatch. New York, July 12.—The body of Walter Muir, 21, who was hanged yesterday at Valleyfield, Quebec, for slaying Henry Lavolette in a tavern brawl at Valleyfield, was brought back to New York today by his widowed mother and an uncle, Patrick Cleary. A crowd stood before the mother's westside apartment when the casket was taken in. Many of the neighbors, who on their own initiative had joined in the appeal to stay the youth's execution, were weeping. Mrs. Anna Morgan, a nurse and friend of the family, gave out the following statement prepared by Mrs. Muir: "My son was not executed; he was murdered. He was the victim of the cowardliness of Canadian politicians."

BURNS PROVE FATAL TO FOUR-YEAR-OLD GIRL

Raymona Marie Green Cloned With Matches—Clothes Caught Fire.

Special to The Advertiser. Chatham, July 13.—Burns sustained Thursday proved fatal Saturday to four-year-old Raymona Marie, daughter of Mrs. Pearl Green, Campbell avenue, Dover Township. The child had been playing with matches, which ignited her clothing. The child's mother is the widow of the late Raymond Green.

M'ADOO WILL AID DAVIS AND BRYAN

Candidate Will Not Form Party To Support Lafolette Movement.

Associated Press Despatch. New York, July 12.—Wm. G. McAdoo, before sailing for Europe today, said he would give the Davis-Bryan ticket his "cordial support" and that he would take part in the campaign on its return in September. "I am satisfied Mr. Davis is in full accord with the progressive program outlined in the Democratic platform," said Mr. McAdoo. "I am confident that as president he would faithfully execute the party's mandate."

After going to see Mr. Davis at the residence of Frank L. Polk in a taxi-cab with a number plate labelled "Al Smith 24" such as thousands of motor cars carried during the convention, Mr. McAdoo said to inquirers: "Mr. Davis and I had a pleasant chat. You know we are very old and very good friends; we discussed the general situation."

Today's statement sets at rest recent rumors that Mr. McAdoo is flirting with the idea of forming an other party of his own or of aiding the Lafolette movement.
