POTATO PRICES WILL BE LOWER

Crop Reports Say Bountiful Harvest With Falling Prices.

Lower prices for potatoes are in prospect according to the statement of local shippers who base their opinion on the fact that the United States has a surplus of forty-one million bushels and the Upper Provinces of Canada also have a surplus. Irish Cobbler potatoes are being shipped now. The crop in this vicinity is reported to be excellent. W. W. Boyce has shipped several carloads from Fredericton already. Three dollars per barrel is the price paid by local shippers but this is expected to drop to \$2.50.

Maine Potatoes Down.
A report from Presque Isle, Me., this morning was that \$2.50 was being offered there by the shippers, the price having eased off. During the summer, buyers are said to have offered four dollars for the crop in the field all through Maine and very few farmers took advantage of the offer thinking that the high prices would continue.

Woodstock shippers today were paying \$2.75 per barrel for Cobblers but on Monday the price is expected to be \$2.50.

In Ontario and Quebec the crop is so good that these provinces are shipping instead of buying. New Brunswick potatoes are superior in quality but their market will be affected. The increase of forty per cent in freight rates also works to the disadvantage of New Brunswick tubers.

No demand like that of last year is anticipated.—Fredericton Mail.

Ottawa, Aug. 30.—There is little prospect of potatoes again reaching a seven dollar level as they did last season, according to statements by local wholesalers who are quoting \$1.75. Reports indicate that the potato crop is in excellent condition, both as to quality and quantity.

WOMAN DIES FROM INJURIES

Jumped From Rapidly Moving Auto and Has Skull Fractured.

As a result of a leap from an auto Friday evening, Mrs. John Aylward, wife of the manager of the Lounsbury Company, Blackville, lies at the Miramichi Hospital, Newcastle with a fractured skull, and small hopes are held for her recovery.

The unfortunate lady, who was of a very nervous temperament, had just left home with her husband and two children for an auto trip to Fredericton. When about five hundred yards from home, when the car was going about thirty-five miles an hour, she told her husband that she was not going to Fredericton, and a moment later shouting "Good-bye Jack" she had opened the door of the car and jumped out.

Besides suffering from bruises Mrs. Aylward sustained a fractured skull as well as internal injuries. She was formerly Miss Murphy of Barnaby River.

TIMBER DUES FOR QUE. CROWN LANDS

New Tariff is Adopted—in Force on September First.

The following information was given out at the Quebec Parliament Buildings last week in connection with the new dues for cutting of timber on the Quebec Crown Lands.

"The Honorable Minister of Lands and Forests, in a report dated August 19, 1920, states that it would be proper to resind order in council, No. 765, dated June 12, 1918, which amended the order in council No. 295, dated April 26, 1910, and also the latter. He therefore recommended that from the 1st of September, this year, the following tariff of dues for the cutting of timber on Crown Lands under license be adopted and put into force:

1. On all square lumber or flats:
A. White pine, oak, carya and walnut, 15 cents per cubic foot.
B. Red pine, elm, ash, cedar, white wood or linden, wild cherry, maple and tamarac, 12 cents per cubic foot.
2. Fir and North American fir, grey pine or cypress, spruce, birch, aspen and poplar, 10 cents per cubic foot.
3. Sawed logs or bark and large timbers, and rough heavy timber:
A. White pine, oak, carya, and walnut, \$5.00 per 1,000 feet.
B. Red pine, elm, ash, white wood or linden, wild cherry, maple and tamarac, \$3.50 per 1,000 feet.
4. Fir, North American fir, grey pine or cypress, spruce, birch, aspen, poplar or cedar, \$2.70 per 1,000 feet.
5. Poles of more than 18 feet and not exceeding 10 inches in diameter at the thin end:
A. 30 feet or less in length, 0.75 cents each.
B. 30 feet to 40 feet, \$1.50 each.
C. 40 to 50 feet, \$3.00 each.
D. 50 feet or more, \$6.00 each.
6. Railway ties of not more than 90 feet, 0.15 cents each.
7. Other articles of value, 15 p. c. ad valorem.

RUM RUNNERS ON RESTIGOUCHE

One Suspect Caught and Others Are Being Closely Watched.

For some time it has been suspected that much liquor which has been in evidence here of late was coming from the Quebec side of the Restigouche river. To some extent this was proven when a resident of Campbellton was up before His Honor and was fined \$100.00 and costs. Seven cases and two jars of liquor in the shipment were seized.

It is said that a number of others are in this business, and a close watch is being kept on several suspects. The liquor is imported to Sandy Hill station, where it is taken charge of and hauled to the river bank, then loaded in motor boats and brought to town, where it finds a ready market.

DEARTH OF PULP WOOD WILL FOLLOW WASTE

That there must soon be not a mere shortage but an absolute dearth of pulp wood, besides which the present paper lack will be regarded as sheer abundance, unless the prevailing extravagantly wasteful destruction of forests is promptly checked, was stressed in an address before the weekly meeting of the Associated Motion Picture Advertisers by Charles Barrell.

Mr. Barrell, back from a three months' journey through the Canadian Northwest, gave a vivid wordpicture of the methods, lack of method and short-sighted improvidence practiced in that great regional source of the bulk of the present supply of paper pulp wood.

"So rapidly are the vast forests being denuded," said the speaker, "that the growth product of, say, 900 years, and in a particular case instanced, even of 1,500 years, are consumed in a single day's felling, a rate of consumption which it was self-evident could not long continue without resulting in practically a total extinction of supply."

In extending an invitation to his hearers to witness at an early date the screening of the remarkable scenic and industrial footage "shot" in the course of his tour, Mr. Barrell pointed out some of the opportunities for novel motion picture material that await the enterprising producer in the Canadian Northwest. "Westerns" widely differing from the type long familiar in the U.S.A. lie ready for the making in that almost untouched territory," said the speaker, "to say nothing of a magnificence of settings and a wealth of detail which thus far the motion picture has merely skimmed."
